

## Leitrim Coastline & Waterways




The rivers Shannon and Erne are the two main river systems in Leitrim and are joined by the recently restored River Foy. Waterways throughout the region of Croke measure 1,000 km long. The county town of Leitrim is the gateway capital of the U.S. Shores and the twin bodies of beautiful modern quays, Derg and Cruise Liner is available in Carrick-on-Shannon and Ballinrobe.

Cruising waters are calling throughout particularly during the peak summer season where a large flotilla of cabin cruisers and river craft of all sizes are seen on the river. The town is lively with a great selection of shops, bars and restaurants. The area boasts many acclaimed musicians providing lively sessions in local pubs nightly. As the route makes its way south through the country it passes through the loamy villages of Drumshanbo, Cromane and Roslare which also have wonderful cycling paths and restaurants.

Trout fishing in the south of the county is well known for its natural and unspoiled character, making it competitive.


The most abundant Salmon and Trout fisheries in the North are situated in the Corrib, Shannon and Burren rivers which include wild salmon, sea trout and brown trout.

# Historic Sites of Leitrim...

## Ballinamore

### Old Courthouse

Up until the 1830's the Old courthouse was a prominent four-storey building. It had a tall bell and contained a court for the keeping of the Great Seal.

## Carrick on Shannon

### Costello Chapel

This simple building is the 2nd smallest Chapel in the world. The building was visited in 1878 by Edward Costello as a memorial and burial place for his wife Josephine. He also buried there.

### McCann

This small church dates back to 1805 for the commemoration and funerals of Owen McCann who died in 1803 who was the Chairman of the Ballyshannon County Council.

## Curragallen

### Margaret the Angel of Delta Memorial

Margaret Gaffney born in Curragallen in 1833. She emigrated with her parents to America and there in 1853 arrived in New Orleans where she promoted a soup kitchen established by fundraising and voluntary development. A statue of Margaret was unveiled in 1884 in New Orleans. It was the first monument to be erected in the USA in honour of a woman.

### Erect 18th Century Graveyard

At Pádraigín's Hill, have you? (Bunratty) over while there be a good history of St Patrick's Hill, a fine example of the region's ancient graveyard of 1800s.

## Cloone

### Cloone Church

The decorated stones in all that remains of Cloone Church were taken from it in 1827. It is surrounded by a dry-stacked wall in which are embedded carved stones. These stones are all that remain of the abbey of St. Columba's Trust.

## Dromahair

### Dromahair Castle

The castle at the head of the Dromahair of Lough Allen was erected here. It was occupied by Brian O'Briain in 1181 before being taken by the English King John in 1185.

### Parke's Castle

This early 17th century plantation castle was once the home of Robert Parke and his family. It was built on the site of an earlier 15th century or Roman tower house. The castle has been extensively restored and is now open to the public.

<b>Convent Abbey</b>	Founded by Fr. Tadhg MacCormac in 1204 and in the 13th century Bishop O'Rourke, it was one of the major monasteries before the Dissolution. Fragments of St. Patrick's Cross, now held in the Library of UCD, were obtained through the abbey.
<b>Drumsna</b>	
<b>Doon of Drumsna</b>	Spanning between 300 m and 400 m, three examples of an early medieval bridge which were constructed. It has been interpreted as a significant feature in the life of the area to control access from the Limerick side of the Shannon across the multiple flooding points on the river.
<b>Patrick Gill Memorial Plaque</b>	A memorial plaque to the volunteer Fireman, Patrick Gill, who died in the Great Fire of 1845. Located on the corner of Main Street and the River Shannon.
<b>Strawbridge Memorial</b>	This memorial is dedicated to Robert Strawbridge who was born in Drumsna in 1732. He converted to Methodism and emigrated to Maryland in America. He is also important in having the first gathering of Methodists in America.
<b>Thomas Headle Parke Memorial</b>	Anglican Major Thomas Headle Parke (1812-1875) had been a soldier and started his career as a surgeon in the Egyptian Campaign. In 1852 he and Henry MURDOCK Stanley who discovered Parke as Chief Medical Officer of the Hospital and invited him to help the Congo. In 1858 he was the first European to discover the legendary mountain of the Moon and a year later became the first man to cross Africa from coast to coast.
<b>Anthony Trollope Trail</b>	An English novelist who was a regular visitor to Drumsna and a secret civil servant. He got his inspiration for his first novel 'The Macbeths of Ballyclough' from a stay at Balford House.
<b>Fenagh</b>	
<b>The Churches of St Cathleen</b>	At Fenagh there are two ancient church ruins on the site of an earlier monastic settlement founded by St. Fachan in the 6th century. A number of sarcophagi in the cemetery are said to mark the buried bodies of monks who died & kept St. Cathleen from Fenagh. The barrel placed at the entrance to the burial area used to be located in the village.
<b>Jamestown</b>	
<b>Old Town Gate &amp; Medieval Friary</b>	The 'Lower Gate' is all that is left of the walled town walls which were erected in 1625.
<b>Jamestown Abbey</b>	A stone cross marks a small gate outside the town gate leading to the grounds of a former priory of the Convent of the Poor Clares and was set up in memory of James Joyce in 1911 by the O'Connells.

## Keshcarrigan

Cheenmore	The large circular stone circle at Cheenmore is an ancient passage grave c.3000 BC. A modern cairn was erected here in 1990 to commemorate the Ballymote fire.
Sheebeg	To the north on the summit of Sheebeg a small cairn can be found. Local folklore maintains that this particular monument is the grave of Ireland's legendary hero Ronny Mac Connell (Finny McCool).

## Kiltyclogher

Black Pig's Dyke	The most significant historical monument in the area is the ancient Black Pig's Dyke which forms an extensive network of ridge and ditch systems stretching from the River Fane to the River Slaney. It is believed to have been built by King Brian Boru in the 10th century AD to defend his kingdom against the Vikings who, at that time, had established themselves in the south of Co. Down.
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## Kinlough

Mac Clancy Castle	In 1588 most surviving shipwrecked sailors from the Spanish Armada took refuge in this castle on Lough Melvin. Some Spanish Armada ships had become trapped by bad weather off the coast of Mayo. One of the survivors was Captain Francisco de Cuellar who lived to write an incredible account of his adventures. A plaque at the castle is dedicated to the survivors.
Four Masters	In 1602 at Kinlough, a branch of Kinlough, a monument was placed on the hedge to commemorate the three martyrs "Don Major" (Moey Deyne) and "Blessed Brother M. Noel O'Dwyer" who died during the "Annals of the Four Masters" in the nearby monastery on the shores of Lough Melvin, 1636.

## Leitrim Village

Ruins of O'Rourkes Castle	The Leitrim castle was a stronghold of the O'Rourkes the Chieftains of Breffni. It was the last of the Irish castles to resist the actions of Queen Elizabeth I following the collapse of the Gaelic social system which followed the defeat of the Irish at Kinsale in 1601. The castles finally submitted English rule in 1607 and their names are mentioned in many of the Annals and in English correspondence with Elizabeth and her successor James I.
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## Manorhamilton

Manorhamilton Castle	The imposing castle was built in 1638 during the plantation of Leitrim by Sir Frederick Hamilton. The local chieftain O'Rourke, O'Gorman and MacNamee ensured that Sir Frederick and his men were given the castle to stay in and resided in 1641. Today the castle stands in ruins, while a large amount of work has been carried out by the castle trustees over a period of time for the castle to be accessible to visitors.
Star Fort	The star fort in Manorhamilton is all that remains of a castle built during the plantation. It is located on an elevated site overlooking the town.

## Mullagh

### O'Carolan Memorial

The 18th century盲fiddler known as Mullagh O'Carolan or Mullagh Carolan was born at the west of Mullagh on the In-Gorge estate near Carrick-on-Shannon. At the age of 22 he became blind as a result of malaria contracted by his parents. He continued to travel as a fiddler. His whereabouts are unknown. He died in 1738 in the house of his then master Alm. Alcock, Captain of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers.

### Farmouth Limekiln

A 19th Century lime kiln located on the Lough Ryan Estate, Lough Eske was essential to any building project as lime mortar was the only method of bonding stones in building work prior to the introduction of cement.

## Tarmon

### John Mc Keown Memorial

A well-known 18th and 19th century piper, John Mc Keown from Tarmon on January 1st 1790. He emigrated to America's eastern seaboard in the New York City area. While there his musical talents were tested and he began to teach bagpipes and flute playing.

### Creevole Ironworks

From c. 1600 there were iron works in the area and wood was used in the smelting process. Mining iron ore continued until the end of the 19th century. In 1792 a Scottish Company re-opened the mine and built what is believed to have been the largest engine house, roasting and casting furnaces, offices, workshop and cottages for workers. This operation closed in 1854 but reopened again in 1861 when it was said to have been involved in the construction of Dublin's Hibernian Bridge.

## Tullaghan

### Tullaghan Cross

This 11th or 12th century cross is believed to be the oldest in Ireland. It stands on the shore of the mouth of the nearby River Drowes. In 1770 the cross was recovered from the sea and placed with other crosses by a local landlord.

### Sweatboxess

Sweatboxes are thought to have been used as saunas. The slopes of Sliebh an tSáinn are dotted with them and good examples can be seen at Ballinaglack on the eastern side of Lough Allen. Beehive in shape, these structures have small doorways. They were traditionally constructed from stone and heated stones were taken inside to heat the interior.

### Famine Graveyards

There are famine graveyards located in Carrick-on-Shannon, Drumshanbo and Manorhamilton. In these graveyards hundreds of famine victims, many of them children, were buried. The memorial garden at the Carrick-on-Shannon graveyard stands as a memorial to the Great Famine and to the famines that continue across the world today.

### Holy Wells

The veneration of saints at holy wells and a belief in the sacred and healing powers of a number of these wells has endured in Ireland from Early Medieval times and is still practiced today. Some of these traditions can be traced to prehistoric times when 'rounds' were made in a clockwise direction around the well following the direction of the sun.
