

Carlow

Carlow is a county of ancient beauty and mystical charm. To the south and south east, the dramatic Blackstairs Mountains frame the county, at the heart of which is Carlow town, a historic and bustling centre with great shopping and a reputation for lively festivals held during the year.

Carlow's scenery is matched by its wealth of picturesque riverside towns and villages, shaped by the rivers Barrow, Burrin and Slaney – towns such as Leighlinbridge, Bagenalstown, Clonegal, Tullow and Rathvilly.

Close to Tullow are the renowned Altamont Gardens, a romantic and lovingly restored garden and just one of the many public gardens for which Carlow is famous, visitors can now enjoy Carlow's unique Garden Trail which features 16 different gardening attractions, a dedicated guide to the Trail is available from Carlow Tourist Office. Carlow is steeped in history; home to mystical pagan sites such as the prehistoric Brownshill Dolmen, early Christian settlements like St Mullins and magnificent Georgian country homes such as Duckett's Grove with its beautiful restored gardens which welcomes visitors.

You'll be amazed at the variety of outdoor activities that can be enjoyed during your time in Carlow, including hiking, cycling, river cruising, angling and golf – see the Activities section of this Guide. Mount Leinster is an internationally renowned location for hang gliding and hang gliders can be viewed taking flight on most Sundays from March to October.

RIVER BARROW

Carlow towns and villages

In Carlow's towns and villages you'll find the warmth of the Irish welcome and a fascinating history, all set against an untouched rural landscape.

Carlow Town D5 is a bustling centre with great shopping, fine restaurants and accommodation. Carlow has a well-earned reputation for lively festivals throughout the year, including the internationally renowned Éigse Arts Festival, an 8-day extravaganza in June each year, featuring visual arts, theatre, comedy, dance, literary events, film, music, crafts and street entertainment. There is an excellent Walking Festival in October and a Floral Festival in August. Carlow boasts a long tradition in river sports and boating activity, with Carlow Regatta, one of the oldest rowing festivals in the country, which takes place on June 4th - 5th 2011, Carlow has many listed river walks, including the National Way Marked Barrow Way. It is also home to Duckett's Grove, originally the 18th, 19th and early 20th century of the Duckett family, whose walled gardens and wooded pleasure grounds are now open to the public. The Visual Centre for Contemporary Art & The George Bernard Shaw Theatre is also located in Carlow.

Tullow E4 is located on the River Slaney and is the nearby home of Altamont Gardens - one of the country's most celebrated gardens. Tullow is also the ancestral home of the Wolseley family of whom Frederick York Wolseley gave his name to the Wolseley car. Golfers can enjoy time at the excellent 18-hole Mount Wolseley Hotel Spa & Country Club and Killerig Resort, Historical sites of interest include Rathgall Stone Fort and the prehistoric burial places of Bawnoge and Haroldstown Dolmen.

Founded on the River Barrow in the 18th century, **Bagenalstown D4** is a charming town, with riverside walks and a picturesque lock close to the fine estate house of Dunlecknev Manor, Also known as Muine Bheag, Bagenalstown derives its name from Walter Bagenal, whose original concept for the town was based on Versailles and the palaces of Louis XIV, with fine streetscapes and classical buildings. The impressive courthouse, modelled on the Parthenon in Athens, is all that remains of Walter Bagenal's dream today, but Bagenalstown continues to be an ideal location

for outdoor activities including angling, inland cruising, cycling and walking tours.

The pretty town of Leighlinbridge D4 is dominated by the medieval ruin of the Black Castle standing sentinel over a 14th century, nine-arched bridge – reputedly one of the oldest functioning bridges in Europe. West of Leighlinbridge is **Old Leighlin D4** the site of a 7th century monastic settlement and the 13th century St Lazerian's Cathedral. A significant church synod took place here in 630 A.D. which influenced the date of Easter for the entire Christian world, a formula still used to this day.

Rathvilly E5 is a picturesque village to the north east of Carlow. Its name derives from a series of ancient raths or forts built along the River Slaney. A statue of the young executed rebel Kevin Barry stands in the town centre. Rathvilly Motte, believed to have been the residence of Crimthan, King of Leinster in the 5th century, commands panoramic views of Wicklow and Mount Leinster.

St Mullins D3 is a tranquil village set deep in the lower Barrow Valley. Nestled between the Blackstairs Mountains on one side and Brandon Hill on the other. St Mullins holds an impressive ecclesiastical history. Originally the site of a 7th century monastery built by St Moling, whom the village is named after, an Abbey was later built here. The ruins of a 10th century round tower and high cross exist to this day.

Clonegal E4 is a charming village and popular walking destination at the end of the Wicklow Way Walking route, with a backdrop of tree-clad hills along the Wicklow/ Wexford border. Situated on the River Derry, Clonegal is home to Huntington Castle a romantic 17th century structure situated in the middle of the village.

Borris D4 is a Georgian town nestling in the valley of the River Barrow, below the curve of the Blackstairs Mountains. The MacMurrough Kavanagh dynasty, former Celtic Kings of Leinster, is central to this town and the family still live at Borris House in the town centre. The Mount Leinster Drive and the Blackstairs Mountains have great scenic views. Clashganny Lock, 5km south of Borris, also has panoramic views of Carlow's rich countryside.

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Altamont Gardens E4 & TAT

Large, beautiful old world garden, Robinsonian in style with a strong emphasis on the informal tradition of combining a good plant collection within the natural landscape of its environment.

Lawns and clipped yews slope down to a lake surrounded by rare trees, shrubs and a profusion of roses both old and modern with herbaceous plants scent the air. There is a steep descent through the "Ice Age Glen" to a beautiful river walk.

Open: Daily, Easter – April 30th, 9.00 – 18.30, May – August 31st, 9.00 – 19.30, September 9.00 – 18.30, October 9.00 – 17.00. Winter; Monday – Thursday, 9.00 – 16.30, Friday, 9.00 – 15.30. Weekends 9.00 – 16.30.

Admission: Free of charge, except for pre-booked guided tours: €2 (Individual). Restricted access for people with disabilities.



The River Barrow D4

Supporting teeming coarse fishing, the 'Lordly Barrow' has been a favourite river for inland cruising and a delightful area for bird watching. The traffic-free towpaths, which once witnessed many passing horses straining to tow the laden barges, now provide a relaxed route for walkers, birdwatchers and anglers. Invaders, traders, merchants and missionaries have left historic footprints along the Barrow, especially noticeable in the many small and interesting town and village settlements.

Brownshill Dolmen E5

Hacketstown Road (R726), Carlow. Sat Nav: 52.834921,-6.844397

Mysterious and majestic, the Brownshill Dolmen has captured the imagination of visitors for centuries. Located 3km east of Carlow, the capstone of this magnificent megalithic tomb is believed to be the largest in Europe, weighing some



103 tons. Its date of construction has been estimated at between 4,900 and 5,500 years ago and it is thought that religious rites were performed here. Some authorities also suggest that it may have served as a form of border marker. Whatever its original purpose, it represents a tangible link between the present and the past.

Duckett's Grove Walled Gardens & Pleasure Grounds E5 & th

Situated just outside Carlow town and originally a Georgian home of a noted Anglo-Irish family, Duckett's Grove was rebuilt in flamboyant, Gothic revival style.

The surviving towers and turrets give this imposing structure a fairy tale air. Following extensive and sensitive restoration, the revived walled gardens and wooded pleasure grounds are now open to the public. Facilities include toilet facilities, car parking and wheelchair access.

Open: Daily, March – September: 8.00 – 21.00, October – March: 8.00 – 16.00. **Admission:** Free of charge. Guide dogs only allowed.



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Oak Park Forest Park E5

Oak Park, Carlow. Sat Nav: 52.847079,-6.918683 Situated on the outskirts of Carlow Town, the park is a mature mixed species woodland of over 120 acres with a predominance of Beech, Oak, Scots Pine, Silver Fir. Larch and Svcamore. Ideal for

leisurely strolls and walks, a visit here is a relaxing and pleasurable experience and a must for any visitor to Co Carlow. The park has colour coded circular walkways of varying lengths, with excellent surfaces and easy gradients. The park also features a picnic area, informal leisure areas and seating at regular intervals.

Open: 28th March - 3rd October, 8.00 - 21.00, Winter months: 8.00 - 16.00. **Admission:** Free of charge.

Huntington Castle was an early O'Kavanagh stronghold. A 17th Century castle, it has been used in a number of period films. The famed Lime tree avenue, Yew tree walk, 18th Century fish pond, a lake and an Old Water Turbine are just some of the features of the castle's

delightful gardens and pleasure grounds. There is also an ancient vine in the conservatory and a Temple to the Goddess Isis in the basement.

Eloquently described as an oasis of peace and tranquility, Delta Sensory Gardens consist of a series of interconnecting

gardens of a multi-sensory nature covering 2.5 acres (1hectare). The gardens are the first in their kind in Ireland with a therapeutic focus to benefit people of all abilities. Visitors can delight in a mix of formal and informal landscapes and the gardens offer something for every season from thousands of daffodils and tulips in spring to the abundant double flowering gorse in summer and the rustic colour of the many trees and beech hedges in autumn and winter. The amazing water features will take your breath away, with splashing fountains, cascading waterfalls and the kugal, one ton of pink marble floating on a cushion of water.

CATHEDRALS, CHURCHES AND ROUND TOWERS

Black Castle D4 Leighlinbridge. Situated on the river Barrow, the first castle on this site was built in 1181 by the Norman. Hugh de Lacy.

Saint Laserian's Cathedral D4 Old Leighlin, Carlow, Tel: 059 972 1570 Contact: The Very Revd Gordon Wynne. St Laserian's Cathedral (13th Century) is on the site of a 7th Century monastery. This site was the location of an important church synod in 630 AD which influenced the system for establishing the date of Easter each year. **Open:** Summer, daily 10.00 to 16.00. Rest of year, please phone for details. Guided tours are available on prior request.

Saint Mullins D3 St. Mullins Heritage Centre, St. Mullins, Co Carlow, Tel: 087 9977090/ 051 424913. Saint Mullins is the location of a splendid collection of early monastic remains including a round tower, monastery and the original stream cutting, believed to have been dug by St. Moling's (died 696 AD) own hands. The former Church of Ireland Church, now houses the St. Mullins Heritage Centre, All aspects of local history including publications, church records, maps, old photographs and artefacts are housed here and provide a fascinating account of village and rural life over the centuries. Genealogy service and guided tours by appointment. **Open:** May – Sep, Tues – Wed: 9:30 - 16:30. Sun: 14.30 - 18.00. Oct - Apr. Mon - Wed: 9:30 - 16.30.

Adelaide Memorial Church E4 Myshall. Tel: 059 9157671. Built as a miniature of Salisbury Cathedral, the church houses many objects of interest. The key is held locally by Mrs. Bridie Daly (white bungalow opposite church grounds).

CASTLES AND HISTORIC BUILDINGS

Ballymoon Castle D4 Bagenalstown. A large, square castle, with imposing entrance gate and formidable square towers measuring 20ft high and 8ft thick. Access to the castle is via a small timber foot bridge.

Dunleckney Manor D4 Bagenalstown. Tel: 059 972 1932. One of Carlow's most magnificent country houses and was the ancient seat of the Bagenals of Idrone. Incorporating the original manor dating to 1612. **Open:** On specific dates only. February – November. Tours every hour from 13.00 – 16.00. Admission: €7, all proceeds go to charity.

Borris House D4 Borris. Tel: 059 977 3105. www.borrishouse.com. Come and explore the ancestral home of the MacMurrough Kavanaghs. Kings of Leinster, set in over six hundred and fifty acres of walled private park and woodlands. Tours feature the Borris Lace Collection, the private chapel and the splendid reception rooms. Open: On specific dates only, January – December. Guided House Tours @ 15.00 arranged by appointment only.

Carlow Castle D5 Carlow. Built in the early years of the 13th century, this was an important and strategically sited fortification on the south eastern corner of the Pale. Now a ruin, it stands on the eastern bank of the River Barrow.





Kilkenny

Kilkenny – a beautiful and ancient county where history, modern living and rich culture fuse together across an unspoiled landscape.

The ancient medieval city of Kilkenny is today a thriving, modern capital that has protected its precious heritage whilst evolving as one of Ireland's most vibrant and enjoyable cities in which to stay. Its narrow slipways, side streets and preserved buildings, are matched only by its reputation for fine dining, great shopping, entertainment and accommodation.

The county itself has a wealth of fascinating visitor attractions, from the wonders of Dunmore Cave and celebrated monastic settlements such as Jerpoint Abbey, to the magnificently restored Kilkenny Castle or the Castlecomer Discovery Park. Kilkenny's many pretty towns and villages such as Inistioge and Bennettsbridge have a relaxed atmosphere, and visitors will feel at home from the moment they arrive. Golfers will be spoiled for choice with a number of challenging courses including the world famous Mount Juliet near Thomastown, while horseracing enthusiasts can head for Gowran Park which holds prominent national horseracing fixtures throughout the year.

But what really sets Kilkenny apart is the extraordinary creativity of its people, earning it the reputation as the creative heart of Ireland. Visits to Kilkenny's many craft studios and workshops, such as those on the "Made in Kilkenny Craft Trail" brochure and at the National Craft Gallery, provide a rare opportunity to watch the artisans at work, and to go home with a unique reminder of your time in the county.

Kilkenny City, towns and villages

Whether your passion is heritage, the great outdoors, or buzzing nightlife. Kilkenny has something for everyone. Here are some towns and villages that are waiting to be explored:

The vibrant medieval city of **Kilkenny D4** displays a wonderful blend of old and new, with beautifully restored historic buildings and charming narrow slipways positioned side by side with shops and restaurants. Kilkenny, from the gaelic Cill Chainnigh, is named after the 6th century monk St. Canice, whose name also survives in the city's 13th century St Canice's Cathedral. Kilkenny's origins date back some 1.500 years, although the Normans, who arrived in the 12th century. left a lasting legacy in many fine buildings including the fully restored Kilkenny Castle and the impressive Rothe House and Gardens on Parliament Street. The city has a colourful calendar of festivals including the Kilkenny Arts Festival, the Cat Laughs Comedy Festival, the popular Rhythm and Roots Festival and the annual Kilkenny Celtic Festival to mention just a few.

A beautiful riverside town, **Bennettsbridge D3** marks one of the oldest crossings of the River Nore. 9km south of Kilkenny City. The first bridge was built here in 1285 and dedicated to St Bennett. Today, Bennettsbridge is an internationally renowned centre for craft and design, with Nicholas Mosse Pottery, Chesneau Leather and Moth to a Flame Candle Makers operating factory stores in the village.

Also in the Nore Valley, **Thomastown D3**, founded in the early 13th century, was originally a walled town complete with 14 towers. It was sacked by Cromwell in 1650 although many interesting ruins remain. Jerpoint Abbey, located outside of Thomastown is an outstanding Cistercian abbey and the best preserved of its kind in the country, and close to the world-famous Mount Juliet Hotel golf resort and equestrian centre.

A popular destination for visitors, the beautiful village of **Inistioge D3**, set deep in the Nore Valley, is surrounded by mature woodland and rolling hills. Woodstock Arboretum and Gardens are located south of the village, while the centre of the village is well catered for by a number of cafés and restaurants.

The scenic riverside town of **Graiguenamanagh D3** is situated on the Carlow/ Kilkenny border. The town's name translates as "the village or valley of the monks" relating to Duiske Abbey, founded in 1204. A popular boating, river cruising, fishing and walking destination. Home to the famous Cushendale Woollen Mills which welcomes visitors.

Also on the River Barrow, Goresbridge D4 is a picturesque village popular for angling and river cruising. The village features as part of the Barrow Way walking trail.

The ancient market town of **Callan C3** was founded in 1217 on the King's River. Once heavily fortified, Callan was the scene of many famous battles dating back to 844. Nearby the ancient village of Kells C3, also founded on the King's River, is home to the ruins of the Augustinian Priory founded in 1193. Mills including a mill museum. Kilree round tower and high cross, and a number of churches and other historical sites all feature in the immediate vicinity along with easy walks.

The village of **Gowran D4** is home to one of Ireland's premier racecourses. Gowran Park also offers excellent 18-hole golf facilities on one of the finest parkland courses in the country. Once the seat of the Kings of Ossory, the village of Gowran held the Collegiate Church dating from 1260, which has been incorporated into the 19th century St Mary's Protestant Church on the village main street.

Mullinavat D2 is a village in the heart of south Kilkenny, popular with anglers and walkers due to its proximity to the rivers Barrow, Nore and Suir and to the picturesque Poulanassy Waterfall. Knocktopher D3 is another small village just north of Mullinavat and is surrounded by fine countryside, woodland and walkways.

Nestled in the hills of north Kilkenny, **Castlecomer D4** is an attractive and lively town. The lakes and walkways of Castlecomer Discovery Park provide angling and walking trails, and the park's interpretive centre is well worth a visit, as are the excellent craft retail units in Castlecomer Estate Yard.

The Irish Conker Championships take place here each October. West of Freshford lies the village of **Urlingford C4** which has many fine walks along the Kilkenny/Tipperary border.







The county's distinctive set of landmarks include the mighty Rock of Cashel, once the seat of the Kings of Munster and the magnificent 12th century Cahir Castle. Other heritage highlights include the Swiss Cottage in Cahir, the Ormond Castle in Carrick on Suir, the Main Guard in Clonmel and Fethard Medieval walled town.

It's a county of spectacular natural beauty with the Glen of Aherlow and the Vee Valley of particular note. Tipperary is a county famous for traditional music, hurling and bloodstock. In fact, the county is one of Ireland's premier horseracing centres.

Tipperary has some other fascinating places to visit, such as Mitchelstown Cave, one of Europe's most spectacular and the captivating Brú Ború Cultural Centre, commemorating Brian Ború with a 'cultural village' celebrating Irish music, song, dance and theatre. A paradise for walkers, anglers, horse riders and heritage & culture lovers, take time to enjoy the great outdoors or simply soak up the atmosphere of this wonderful and welcoming county.

Tipperary towns and villages

Tipperary is a captivating area of mountains and valleys. populated by historic towns and villages.

The ancient town of **Cashel B3** and its surrounding countryside are dominated by the spectacular Rock of Cashel – a collection of early Christian and medieval buildings, including a fine cathedral, round tower and very early Romanesque doorway. Once the seat of the Kings of Munster. St Patrick is known to have preached from the Rock of Cashel in the 5th century while Brian Ború was crowned King of Ireland here in the 11th century. The Brú Ború Cultural Centre in the town offers the best of traditional Irish music, song and dance shows. Cashel's history unfolds further at the Cashel Heritage Centre in the town. Cashel town itself is a lively place with restaurants, traditional pubs and quality accommodation.

Set in the heart of the Golden Vale, the village of **Dundrum A3** is surrounded by forest and has a number of listed walks. It is also home to the Dundrum House Hotel and Golf Club. To the south, Cahir B2 is an ancient and bustling town originally built around Cahir Castle, the 12th century Norman castle standing on a stony island on the River Suir. The square in Cahir was developed in the 18th century and was embellished in the 1840's by William Tinsley from Clonmel. This embelishment largely consisted of added features (such as the columns on Irwins pub and adjacent buildings) to bring some consistency to the 'look' of the square. Shortly after this work Tinsley moved to Cinncinnati and designed many public buildings and churches there. John Nash designed the Swiss Cottage. St Pauls Church and the Erasmus Smith House, all in Cahir, and was famous for designing Regent Street and Regents Park in London, the Brighton Pavillion and many other fine buildings (including the ill-fated Shanbally Castle at Burncourt near Cahir). To the west, the dramatic **Galtee Mountains A2** offer good walking trails, including the Tipperary Heritage Way which can be walked in four stages from the Vee to Cashel and takes in the area's breathtaking scenery. Nearby Mitchelstown Cave offers access to three enormous underground caverns displaying incredible drip stone formations.

Clonmel B2 is a historic and lively town set amidst beautiful mountain scenery. Nestled in the Comeragh Mountains with Slievenamon to the east and the

Knockmealdown range to the south, it's the ideal base for exploring the surrounding countryside. South Tipperary County Museum tells the story of the area from prehistoric times to modern day, while the Clonmel Heritage Trail takes in the main historical features of the town. The Main Guard, located in the centre of Clonmel, is a building of historical importance and dates back to between 1673 and 1684. Clonmel Racecourse has a busy calendar of events, while garden lovers can visit the award winning Killurney Garden. Clonmel has a thriving arts scene with regular theatre, concerts and exhibitions at the South Tipperary Arts Centre.

The Glen of Aherlow A3 is a 16-mile stretch across some of Tipperary's most breathtaking countryside. Shaped by the River Aherlow, this popular walking and horse trail through valleys and up to beautiful corrie lakes deep in the Galtee range. The Glen of Aherlow sits between the Galtee Mountains on the south and Slievenamuck Ridge on the North and is bounded by the villages of Galbally A3 and **Bansha**. The Glen of Aherlow is a Walkers Welcome location.

Just north of the Glen of Aherlow, **Tipperary Town A3** lies along the River Ara. The long history of Tipperary, from its 12th century Anglo Norman settlements to its contribution in the war of independence, can be accessed at the Tipperary Excel Heritage Centre in the town. Outside the town. Tipperary Race Course holds flat racing and national hunt meetings, while golfers are well catered for at the scenic Tipperary Golf Club and Ballykisteen Golf and Country Club.

Founded in the early 9th century, Carrick on Suir C2 is home to many fine examples of Anglo Norman castles, bridges, parks and churches. Ormond Castle, an imposing four-towered structure was built in the 1400s and later incorporated into the formidable Ormond Castle around 1560. The Old Bridge spanning the River Suir is one of the most striking stone bridges in Ireland. The town has a marina, and other activities available include fishing, golf and scenic walks.

Fethard B3 has been a walled town since the 13th century and within its very intact walls are many Churches, Friaries, towers and Sheela-na-Gig carvings.







Waterford City, the oldest city in Ireland, is the perfect blend of ancient and modern. Its collection of pubs, gourmet restaurants and excellent shops and boutiques, co-exist with medieval city walls, quaintly cobbled back streets and the grandeur of historic buildings still standing proud after more than a thousand years.

Waterford boasts an excellent choice of world-class visitor attractions from the spectacular Copper Coast Geopark, to Waterford's Viking Triangle, and of course, the new House of Waterford Crystal, renowned the world over for the craftsmanship of its master glass cutters.

Waterford's picturesque coastline, stretching the length of the county, is dotted with a string of lively towns including Tramore, Dunmore East and Dungarvan. Other coastal villages include Passage East, Stradbally and Ring, the centre of a thriving Irish speaking community.

For the adventurous there are plenty of water activities such as diving, kayaking, surfing, sailing and kite-surfing. To the west of the county, nestled close to the Comeragh Mountains, lie the pretty towns of Lismore, Cappoquin and Ballymacarbry along the Nire Valley.

This is a natural playground for equestrian, walking, angling, watersports and cycling holidays in a county that's ideal for holidays of all kinds.

Waterford city, towns and villages

With a choice between a cosmopolitan modern city, a cluster of seaside resorts and a mountainous hinterland, here are some towns and villages well worth a visit:

Waterford City D2 is the capital of the South East and Ireland's oldest city with its historic heart "The Viking Triangle". Founded by the Vikings in 853, the history of this ancient port is maintained in its many remarkable buildings including Reginald's Tower and Christ Church Cathedral. Waterford is synonymous with hand-cut glass, and the new House of Waterford Crystal is the region's most popular tourist attraction. Built on the River Suir estuary, Waterford City remains a thriving port with great shopping, accommodation, quality gourmet restaurants and a mix of modern and traditional pubs. Waterford Spraoi, Imagine Arts Festival, Waterford New Music Week and The Tall Ships Race returns to Waterford in 2011.

Dunmore East D1 is a charming fishing port and seaside resort set into rugged coastline at the mouth of Waterford estuary. It's an unspoiled getaway full of silent coves, clean beaches, fine restaurants and accommodation. The popular annual Guinness Bluegrass Music Festival takes place here every August.

Dungarvan C1 is a thriving market town and medieval port. The Dungarvan Museum recounts the history of the town and the 12th century motte and bailey at Gallows Hill survives to this day. There's lots to do in Dungarvan, from water sports and deep-sea fishing to fine dining and shopping.

With 5km of sandy beaches, **Tramore D2** is a popular family friendly resort, with activities from surfing, sailing and kayaking to cliff walking and golf. There are giant waterslides and indoor swimming pool at Splashworld and an Amusement Park opposite the promenade. The 18-hole Tramore Golf Club is located outside the town.

To the west of the county lies the seaside village of **Ardmore B1**. Originally a 5th century monastic settlement, founded by St Declan – a monk who preceded St Patrick in christianising the country, Ardmore is famous for its 12th century Round Tower, one of the finest examples of this type of structure in Ireland.

Located in a beautiful setting, the village of **Ballymacarbry B2** is the perfect spot from where to explore the Comeragh Mountains and scenic Nire Valley. Walking and game fishing are on offer, and these, along with quality guesthouse accommodation, make this an ideal rural retreat.

Cappoquin B1 is a quiet market town in West Waterford at the head of the Blackwater River estuary. The area offers scenic walks and angling. The 18th century Cappoquin House and Gardens in the centre of the town are open to the public at set times and Tourin House and Gardens are open for visitors between April and September.

The beautiful town of **Lismore B1** was once home to a 6th century monastery sacked by the Vikings and was later developed as an estate town. Popular visitor attractions include the Lismore Heritage Centre and Lismore Castle Gardens. The 2011 Immrama Lismore Festival of Travel Writing takes place between 9th and 12th June. Just north of Lismore is The Vee, a wonderfully scenic spot at the foot of the Knockmealdown Mountains.

West of Waterford City lies **The Copper Coast C1**, one of the most scenic stretches of rugged coastline in Ireland. It passes through the villages of **Fenor, Annestown, Boatstrand, Bunmahon** and **Stradbally**, with **Dunhill** just inland. The Copper Coast European Geopark offers an excellent guided trail of the area. Inland is the quiet market town of **Kilmacthomas C2**, an ideal centre for setting out on walking tours of the Comeragh Mountains.

Ring C1 or An Rinn in Irish, is a scenic Gaeltacht area south of Dungarvan where Irish (Gaeilge) is the first language of the people. Its people, beautiful scenery, seascape and above all its cultural vitality make Ring a unique place to visit.

The South East Coastal Drive offers stunning views of rock formation, coves and imposing headlands. The Waterford section of the drive from Passage and Dunmore East in the east takes in the towns of Tramore, Dungarvan and many smaller villages until it reaches Ardmore in the west.







Wexford

With a spectacular coastline, a wealth of historic sites and attractive towns and villages, it's little wonder that Wexford is a favourite holiday destination for visitors and locals alike.

The county offers a mix of mountainous scenery, river valleys with fine fishing, and mile upon mile of fine, unspoiled beaches such as Courtown, Rosslare, Duncannon and Curracloe. The South East Coastal Drive is perhaps the best way to take in part of Wexford's 200 kilometres of stunning coastline.

Wexford is a historic county with bustling towns such as Enniscorthy, Gorey, New Ross and Wexford Town. It has many fascinating visitor attractions to choose from including the remarkable Hook Lighthouse, the Irish National Heritage Park, the "living history" of the Dunbrody Heritage Ship, Irish American Museum and the Ros Tapestry in New Ross, the Irish Agricultural Museum at Johnstown Castle Estate. Wexford is also home to the new state of the art venue – The Wexford Opera House. Wexford is a county of spectacular parks and gardens, such as The John F Kennedy Arboretum – ideal for a family walk and picnic. It is also world renowned for the diverse range of bird-life that inhabits and passes through its nature reserves.

A full calendar of events, including the world famous Wexford Festival Opera and Wexford Fringe Festival, the Co. Wexford Strawberry Festival and the Duncannon Sand Sculpting Festival, ensures there's always something fun to see and do.

Wexford towns and villages

The towns and villages of Wexford are full of character. Here are some places that you are sure to enjoy:

Dating back to the 2nd Century, **Wexford F2** is a lively town with winding streets, a pretty quayside and an array of pubs, cafes and fine restaurants. It's a shopper's paradise with an excellent range of shops, from small boutiques to craft shops with unique hand crafted goods. Places of interest just outside the town include the Irish National Heritage Park, The Irish Agricultural Museum and the Wexford Wildfowl Reserve. The town hosts a colourful calendar of events throughout the year, including the world famous Wexford Festival Opera which takes place in October. Within easy reach of many fine beaches, coastal drives and walks, Wexford is the ideal base to explore the county and region.

Rosslare Strand F2 is a popular Blue Flag seaside resort with quality self-catering accommodation and great watersports, golf and walking trails. **Rosslare Harbour F2** is a small yet busy port town providing passenger ferry services to Wales and northern France. To the south, **Carnsore Point F2** and **Lady's Island F2** are noted for bird watching, good beaches and many historic sites.

New Ross D3 is a thriving town set in rich rolling countryside on the mouth of the River Barrow. New Ross is home to the Dunbrody Famine Ship, a recreation of the actual 19th century timber-built ship on which actors re-enact the hardships of transatlantic crossings of the 1840s. New Ross is also the ancestral birthplace of John F. Kennedy, and five generations of the Kennedy clan are celebrated at the Kennedy Homestead. A life sized statue of John F. Kennedy has recently been unveiled on the quayside in New Ross. Also in New Ross, The Ros Tapestry exhibition is well worth a visit.

South of New Ross, the Ring of Hook Drive takes visitors along a scenic coast road through **Ballyhack, Arthurstown, Duncannon, Campile D2** and **Fethard on Sea E2**, taking in some of the county's finest heritage sites along the way.

Enniscorthy E3 is a cathedral town on the River Slaney overlooked by the 1798 Vinegar Hill battle site. An early Norman settlement, Enniscorthy is dominated by the town's Castle built in 1205. The National 1798 Rebellion Centre in the town

gives an insight into the birth of modern democracy in Ireland. The colourful Co. Wexford Strawberry Fair is held in the town every year. Enniscorthy also boasts a strong tradition in the creation of craft and quality pottery.

To the north, **Ferns F4** is a pretty village with a long and fascinating history. Ferns Castle stands a shattered fortress which was built by the Normans in the 13th century. The village also features a 12th century Abbey and four high crosses, dating back to the 8th and 9th centuries.

Further north, **Gorey F4** is a thriving market town with striking architecture from the 18th and mid-19th centuries. This is an excellent base from where to explore the outlying countryside of Wexford and Wicklow. There's also great golf at a number of courses including the Seafield Golf and Country Club.

Bunclody E4 is a pretty market town at the foot of the Blackstairs Mountains, bordered by the sweeping River Slaney. Bunclody offers angling and canoeing facilities and is a good base for cycling and walking tours.

Just a few miles north of Wexford Town, **Curracloe F3** has a celebrated Blue Flag beach, and is a popular location with holiday makers. It was also the location for the film 'Saving Private Ryan'. **Blackwater F3** and **Kilmuckridge F3** are seaside towns with good self-catering and camping facilities. Further north, **Courtown F4** is a popular holiday resort, with a beautiful Blue Flag beach. With miles of sandy seafront, Courtown offers a wide variety of leisure facilities for all the family, such as Forest park Leisure Centre, not to mention walking routes, local amusements and quality self-catering accommodation.

On Wexford's south coast, **Kilmore Quay E2** is a pretty fishing village with whitewashed thatched houses, a harbour and marina. This well renowned angling centre is a popular destination for visitors and is a sea angling centre of excellence. Boat trips can be taken around the uninhabited Saltee Islands, popular with bird watchers. To the north of Kilmore Quay, the village of **Foulksmills E2** is surrounded by lush countryside and dotted with pleasant walking trails.

Statue of Commodore Barry F2 Cresent Quay, Wexford Town. The Father of the American Navy.

Brown Clayton's Folly E4 Carrigbyrne. Locally known as the 'Pinnacle' and measuring 28.5 meters high, this is a replica of Pompei's Alexandrian column, built in 1839 in memory of Sir Ralph Abercromby.

Enniscorthy Castle – A View from the Keep E3 Recently renovated and refurbished. Enniscorthy Castle explores the development of the castle and town from its earliest Anglo-Norman origins, (12th Century) to the present day. The roof is also accessible, with spectacular views of the surrounding buildings, Vinegar Hill, and countryside. **Open:** Weekdays: 9.30 – 17.00, Saturday, Sunday, Bank Holidays, 12.00 – 17.00. Admission: FREE for initial period.

Touring Routes

We have chosen some great driving routes which will introduce you to many of the region's most famous sights and attractions and also to lesser known gems.

Please note that the length and recommended time of drives are approximate, depending on number of sites visited along routes and time spent there. Routes can be travelled in any direction and from any starting point, map illustrations are intended as a guide only, and routes should be used in conjunction with reference to a good road map of Ireland.

KILKENNY TIPPERARY HERITAGE ROUTE

Route 1: Kilkenny » Cahir » Cashel » Kilkenny

Distance: 177 km (109 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day (or 2 with an overnight stay)

From the historic city of **Kilkenny**, with its many visitor attractions take the N76, branching off

onto the R691 for Cashel. Continue to the town of **Ballingarry**, the scene of the Young Irelanders rising in 1848, and take time to travel a short distance north to The Commons, a small settlement with many memorials to sporting, musical and patriotic natives of the area.

Travel back towards Ballingarry & the R691, and continue towards **Killenaule**, branching south on the R689 to the old walled town of **Fethard**. From here continue towards the historic town of **Cashel** once the seat of the Kings of Munster and home of the mighty Rock of Cashel.

From Cashel, drive south along the R639 (or alternatively the M8) to **Cahir** where the magnificent 13th century Cahir Castle sits on an island in the River Suir. A nearby attraction is the Swiss Cottage. Take the N24 to **Clonmel**, a bustling town, and Carrick-on-Suir, home to the Dove Hill Craft Outlet, and the Elizabethan Ormonde Castle in the village. Head north from **Carrick-on-Suir** on the R697 back towards Kilkenny to see the ancient high cross at Ahenny, walk one of the looped trails at **Castlemorris**, visit the Famine Memorial Garden at **Newmarket**, and visit the remains of a 12th century priory at **Kells**.

NORE VALLEY AND BARROW RIVER ROUTE

Route 2: Carlow » Kilkenny » New Ross » Carlow

Distance: 158 km (97 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day (or 2 with an overnight stay)

Leave **Carlow** Town heading west over Graiguecullen Bridge and drive through the scenic Killeshin area (R430). Continue



towards Castlecomer turning left onto the N78. Visit the **Castlecomer Discovery Park** on approach to the village. Continue along the N78 towards Kilkenny to visit **Dunmore Cave** and onwards to **Kilkenny City**, Ireland's Medieval Capital where medieval buildings and attractively covered slipways are only some of the historical features on offer. Visit the fully restored Kilkenny Castle and enjoy the first class shopping and dining in the city. From Kilkenny drive south along the R700 to **Bennettsbridge**, home to many renowned craft shops such as Nicholas Mosse Pottery. Visit also the Nore Valley Open Farm and the Nore View Folk Museum. Continue on the R700 to **Thomastown**, where you can visit Jerpoint Abbey, one of the most interesting and best-preserved Cistercian ruins in the country; and **Inistioge**, home of the beautifully restored Woodstock Gardens. Continue to the port town of **New Ross**, home of the Dunbrody Famine Ship and Ros Tapestry, returning to Carlow through the beautiful and historic villages of St. Mullins, **Graiguenamanagh** and from **Gowran** on the R448, where if time allows, a visit to the riverside villages of **Bagenalstown** and **Leighlinbridge** is encouraged.

THE CATHEDRAL ROUTE

Route 3: Carlow » New Ross » Enniscorthy » Carlow

Distance: 155 km (96 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

This pleasant route through counties Carlow and Wexford takes in many of the region's best known ecclesiastical visitor attractions along the Barrow and Slaney rivers. Starting out from the Cathedral



town of **Carlow**, drive south along the N9 to **Leighlinbridge**. Continue on the N9 to **Gowran**, home of St Mary's medieval Collegiate Church. At **Graiguenamanagh** you can visit Duiske Abbey, an early Cistercian Church in Ireland built around 1204. **St Mullins** is a scenic and charming village on the River Barrow with an impressive ecclesiastical history. Entering Co Wexford you'll reach the towns of **New Ross**, featuring the Dunbrody Famine Ship docked along the Quays and Ros Tapestry. The ancient Norman settlement and Cathedral town of **Enniscorthy** on the River Slaney. The route returns north to Carlow town through the pretty towns of **Bunclody** and **Tullow**, home to the beautiful Altamont Gardens which welcomes visitors. Carlow has a new dedicated Ecclesiastical Trail.

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ACTIVITIES

THE THREE RIVER ROUTE

Route 4: Kilkennv » New Ross » Enniscorthy

» Kilkennv

Distance: 154 km (95 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

This charming route takes you through many picturesque towns and villages along the rivers Barrow. Nore & Slanev. Kilkenny City is the perfect starting point, where the fully restored Anglo-Norman Kilkenny Castle looms



magnificently over the river Nore. From there, follow the Nore Valley route (R700) through Bennettsbridge and Thomastown to the pretty village of **Inistioge**, where the Hollywood films "Circle of Friends" and "Widows Peak" were shot.

Continue on to New Ross in Co. Wexford, home to the Dunbrody Famine Ship, JFK Arboretum, Ros Tapestry and Kennedy Homestead.

From New Ross, travel on the N30 to Enniscorthy, overlooked by the 1798 battle site of Vinegar Hill, where you can visit the National 1798 Rebellion Centre. To the north on the N80. Bunclody is an attractive market town at the foot of the Blackstairs Mountains. From here, travel west towards Goresbridge, a scenic spot on the river Barrow popular with anglers; and Gowran, where St. Mary's Collegiate Church can be visited. Return to Kilkenny via the R712.

TIPPERARY TOWNS ROUTE

Route 5: Clonmel » Tipperary Town » Clonmel Distance: 132 km (82 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

Travel through the beautiful countryside and picturesque towns of Tipperary, starting out at **Clonmel** nestled in the Comeragh Mountains and home to the South Tipperary Arts Centre. From Clonmel travel on to the heritage town of Cahir

with nearby attractions of Swiss Cottage and Cahir Castle.

Bansha provides the gateway to the stunning Glen of Aherlow. **Tipperary Town** on the beautiful River Ara is in the heart of the 'Golden Vale'. The Tipperary Excel Centre offers cinema and theatre entertainment. From Tipperary travel to **Golden** and the nearby ruins of Athassel Abbey. East along the N24, Cashel is an important heritage town where the formidable Rock of Cashel, once the seat of the Kings of Munster, dominates the surrounding countryside. Visitors can find out more about the town and its history at the Brú Ború Cultural Centre and the Cashel Heritage Centre. Return to Clonmel via Fethard on the R692 and R689.

Museum of Transport, take the R680 to Carrick-on-Suir and visit Ormond Castle. East along the N24, Waterford City is the region's vibrant, cosmopolitan capital with great shopping, dining and a wealth of historic and contemporary visitor attractions including the House of Waterford Crystal, Bishops Palace & Gardens and Edmund Rice Heritage Centre.

Leaving the city, head south to **Dunmore East** and west along the stunning R675 coast road to Tramore. From Tramore travel along one of Ireland's most scenic drives, "The Copper Coast" and visit the European Geo Park en route to **Dungarvan**, a thriving seaside town and home to Dungarvan Castle and Town Museum.

Cappoquin and **Lismore** are two picturesque towns close to the scenic Nire Vallev with a number of popular visitor attractions. The Vee Pass offers stunning views across the region's rich countryside. Return to Clonmel via the R665 road.

Kilkenny Bennettsbridge o Inistioge New Ross Mullinavat Waterford and contemporary visitor attractions

Reginald's Tower and Edmund Rice Heritage Centre. Leaving Waterford, travel north along the N25 to New Ross, home of the Dunbrody Famine Ship, Ros Tapestry and Kennedy Homestead.

From New Ross continue to travel north on the R700 to the picturesque village of Inistioge and visit the wonderfully maintained gardens at Woodstock. Continue to travel up the Nore Valley (R700) through the villages of Thomastown & Bennettsbridge and on to Kilkenny City, the medieval capital of Ireland. Kilkenny City is a treat to explore on foot with many striking medieval structures including the magnificent and fully restored Kilkenny Castle. From Kilkenny take the main Waterford Road, N10 and then R713 and R448 through Mullinavat back to Waterford City.

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BY HOOK OR BY CROOKE ROUTE

Route 8: Waterford City » Wexford

Distance: 184 km (114 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

This is a stunning route taking in the rugged coastline of the Hook Peninsula. Starting in **Waterford City**, the cosmopolitan capital of the South East.



head east to the pretty fishing village of **Dunmore East** and take in the towns of **Passage East, Ballyhack** and **Duncannon** where you can visit Duncannon Fort, near the popular Duncannon beach front.

From here travel south to **Hook Head**, home of the famous Hook Lighthouse, one of the oldest working lighthouses in the world. The rugged Wexford coastline takes you around to **Fethard-on-Sea** with many fine sandy beaches.

North along the R737, **Saltmills** is home to one of Wexford's top attractions, Tintern Abbey. From Saltmills travel north to **New Ross** where the Famine Ship Dunbrody is docked and where the JFK Arboretum and Kennedy Homestead mark the ancestral home of the Kennedy family. Return to Waterford via the N25.

SURF AND TURF ROUTE

Route 9: Wexford Town » Gorey » Graiguenamanagh » Wexford Town

Distance: 205 km (128 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

This picturesque route takes the visitor from historic **Wexford Town** along much of the region's stunning coastline and into the beautiful countryside of Co. Carlow.



Start at **Wexford town** which has origins dating back to the 2nd century. A visit to historic Selskar Abbey offers the perfect setting for understanding the historical development of Wexford. Drive along the east coast to **Courtown** and **Gorey**, and head south to the ancient Norman settlement of **Enniscorthy** on the River Slaney, home to the National 1798 Rebellion Centre. From here, re-trace your tracks for 8 kms, then take the N80 until you reach the pretty market town of **Bunclody**.

Travel on to **Kittealy** and **Borris** nestled in the fertile valley of the River Barrow. From Borris, travel east to **Graiguenamanagh** home of Duiske Abbey and the Cushendale Woollen Mills. **St Mullins** is a pretty and ancient riverside village leading to **New Ross**, the ancestral home to John F Kennedy. Return to Wexford Town via the N25.



Route 10: Wexford Town

Distance: 193 km (120 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

Starting from the ancient Viking settlement of **Wexford Town**, with origins dating back to 2nd century, head south east along the N25



where you'll reach the popular, blue flag seaside resort of Rosslare.

South of Rosslare, **Lady's Island** is an ancient place of pilgrimage and **Carnsore Point** is a popular international destination for bird watching. East along the coast, **Kilmore Quay** is a pretty fishing village offering excellent seafood, while further inland, **Wellington Bridge** is a pretty village at the head of Bannow Bay. Turning left onto the R737 you'll reach **Fethard-on-Sea** and **Hook Head**, home to the famous Hook Lighthouse.

Continue around the Hook Peninsula to **Duncannon**, a popular seaside resort which hosts the International Sand Sculpting Festival every summer. The R733 leads to **New Ross** where the Dunbrody Famine Ship and the Galley Restaurant are both moored at New Ross quay. Return to Wexford via the N25.

THE SOUTH EAST Coastal Drive

Route 11: Wexford Town to Ardmore

Distance: 210 km (130 miles) Recommended Time: 1 Day

Stretching the full length of the south Wexford and Waterford coast, the South East Coastal Drive is one of the most popular and visually stunning coastal drives in the country.

From **Wexford Town** to the pretty fishing village of **Kilmore Quay** which is an angling centre of excellence and around the rugged **Hook Peninsula**, home of the historic Hook Head Lighthouse, the drive crosses into Waterford city and county.

The route takes you into the pretty harbour towns of **Passage East** and **Dunmore East** on the Waterford Estuary, and on to the bustling towns of **Tramore** and **Dungarvan**, taking in one of Ireland's scenic drives, "The Copper Coast". From Dungarvan, the drive takes you to **Helvick** and into **Ring**, an Irish speaking area and wonderfully scenic part of the South East region. The South East Coastal Drive concludes or begins (depending on the direction you take) at **Ardmore**, a lovely seaside town, home to the annual Pattern festival.

Adventure & Water Sports

The Sunny South East is awash with fun-filled Water Sports and Adventure activities for the young and the young-at-heart.

With the Atlantic Ocean on two sides and five of Ireland's principal rivers flowing through the region, the South East really cleans up when it comes to water sport fun. Sub-aqua, sailing, swimming, diving, water skiing, rowing, canoeing, land yachting, surfing and river cruising are all catered for in the South East, with expert guidance on hand from specialist groups.

Why not try your hand at kitesurfing – an exhilarating fusion of windsurfing, water skiing and paragliding that's not for the faint hearted! Sailing is also popular with visitors and the region is well served with many listed visitor moorings and marina facilities. Blo karting provides a sailing experience for those who want to stay on dry land!

For those of you who like to stay dry but savour the taste of adrenalin, the South East offers excellent rock climbing, archery, orienteering, quad biking, karting, shooting, flying and even hang-gliding over the dramatic Mount Leinster area. There are also a number of excellent archery and orienteering clubs where you are welcome to come along and make your mark.

Corporate groups and friends can enjoy the thrilling game of paintball played at a number of specialised centres located throughout the region. South East Ireland Pocket Guide

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

Angling

With five of Ireland's principal rivers and the Atlantic Ocean surrounding its rugged coastline, the South East is an attractive location for anglers of all levels of experience.

The region's rivers afford the game fisherman superb opportunities to fish for Wild Brown Trout, Salmon, and Sea Trout in season. Coarse anglers are well catered for with the river Barrow offering first class mixed fishing for Bream, Dace, Rudd, Roach, and Perch, excellent fishing for Roach and Dace on the river Blackwater, and also a number of well appointed managed coarse fisheries.

The South East's coastline plays host to arguably the best Bass fishing in Europe, while deep sea angling trips are available through a number of registered charter boat operators targeting a range of species including Ling, Pollack, Cod, Conger, and Tope.

The purchase of a state licence is necessary to fish for Salmon and Sea Trout, along with on most fisheries a daily permit. Certain Brown Trout Fisheries may also require the purchase of a day permit; however coarse angling and sea angling are free.

The normal angling season for Salmon, Sea Trout, and Brown Trout is March 17th to 30th September. There is no closed season for coarse angling, and apart from Bass (closed season 15th May – 15th June) sea anglers can also fish all year round. For current legislation on all angling disciplines log on to **www.fisheriesireland.ie**, or contact the local regional fisheries board (contact details below) in advance of travelling to the South East.


Please note that many of the gardens are strictly by appointment while others take groups only. It is essential to contact the Proprietor/Manager before making your visit.



Generally peaceful and scenic, trekking is one of the most pleasurable ways to spend a tranquil few hours with an equine partner. Other horse riding activities available in the region include Polo-cross, horse shows and cross country events.

The region is also famous for its great racing, its world famous trainers and its happy punters, with five of the finest racecourses in the country. Gowran Park, Clonmel, Tramore, Tipperary and Wexford Town. The South East runs a busy calendar of track fixtures for both flat and hunt meetings throughout the year. 

- Tipperary Heritage Trail (56km) starts at the Vee (scenic area north of Lismore) and ends in Cashel.
- Blackwater Way (168km) starts in Clogheen, Co. Tipperary and ends in Shrone, Co. Kerry.
- Ballyhoura Way (80km) starts at St. John's Bridge, Co. Cork, and ends at Limerick Junction Railway Station (Co. Tipperary).



The speed limit is 120kph on motorways, 100kph on national roads and 80kph on non-national roads. Brown signposts with white lettering provide information on visitor attractions including castles, accommodation, tourist information offices, scenic areas and picnic sites.

BANKS

Banks are generally open from Monday to Friday from 10.00 – 16.00. Each bank has one later opening day per week. Bureau de Change facilities as well as ATM machines are available at most banks. Money transfers can be organised through Western Union Money Transfer.

CLIMATE

Influenced by the Gulf Stream, Ireland has a mild temperature climate with the average summer temperature around 15°C. Areas close to the coast rarely have a large difference between summer and winter conditions, with an average 10°C difference between January and July. Typical winter weather in Ireland is cloudy and raining with the occasional sunny spell. temperatures around January average 5°C. For regional forecasts, please log onto: www.met.ie

CREDIT CARDS

MasterCard, Visa and American Express credit cards are widely accepted in Ireland.

CURRENCY

The unit of currency in the Republic of Ireland is the Euro. One euro consists of 100 cents. Notes are \in 5, \in 10, \in 20, \in 50, \in 100, \in 200, \in 500. Coins are 1c, 2c, 5c, 10c, 20c, 50c, \in 1 and \in 2.

ELECTRICTY

The standard voltage in the Republic of Ireland is 220 volts. Plugs are 3-pin flat, therefore adapters are required for 2-pin appliances. En-suite bathroom shaving points normally have 110 and 240 volt outlets.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

In Ireland the general Emergency Telephone number is 999 or 112 – no coins required in telephone coin boxes. These numbers will alert the appropriate service – Fire, Gardaí (Police), Lifeboat, Coastal, Mountain and Cave Rescue Services.
