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

Welcome to Ireland's East on Dublin's Doorstep

Dublin's Doorstep comprises the six counties of Kildare, Laois, Louth, Meath, Monaghan and Wicklow that surround Ireland's capital city. Fascinating and compelling, this region is at the very centre of Ireland's history and culture.

Dublin's Doorstep is rich in ancient heritage sites from the retreat of St. Kevin in Glendalough in Wicklow to the world heritage site in Newgrange or the monastic site of Monasterboice, in the historic Boyne Valley. Visit the stately home at Emo Court in Laois, the tranquillity and beauty of Carlingford in Louth or the birthplace of poet and novelist, Patrick Kavanagh, in the village of Inniskeen in County Monaghan.

Attractions range from the Irish National Stud, Japanese Garden's and St. Fiachra's Gardens in Kildare to Powerscourt House and Gardens in Wicklow, just one of the many stately homes and gardens open to the public. Enjoy the fine sandy beaches dotted along the coastline and take in the natural views and beauty of both land and sea.

Dublin's Doorstep has a variety of quality links and parkland golf courses. It hosted the Ryder Cup in 2006, and is hosting the Solheim Cup 2011 which is being held in Killeen Castle in County Meath.




Kildare

Kildare's famous racecourses, The Curragh, Punchestown and Naas are home to exciting racing festivals, whilst the Irish National Stud is testament to the county's strong horse breeding tradition. In addition, the county offers a range of special interest activities such as golf, motor racing, fishing, ecology, cruising and walking. In September 2006, the K Club hosted the most prestigious international golfing event, "The Ryder Cup".

County Kildare's many heritage attractions are of great importance to the island of Ireland and provide much to interest the visitor. Explore the heritage towns of Athy and Kildare. Visit Leixlip, where Guinness was first brewed and Maynooth, a traditional university town since the 18th century. See the many houses and gardens on offer such as the magnificent Castletown or experience the wilderness of the Bog of Allen.

Visit Newbridge, a thriving retail town and home to the world famous Newbridge Silverware factory. Spend time at Kildare Village Shopping Outlet. With over 50 luxury outlet boutiques you will be sure to pick up a bargain or two.





Kildare towns and villages

In Kildare's towns and villages you'll find the warmth of the Irish welcome and a fascinating history, all set against an untouched rural landscape.

Athy G3 is a designated historic town on the Grand Canal with 3 historic walking trails. The original Market House, in the town centre is now a Heritage Centre which houses a remarkable collection of artefacts and memorabilia of Ernest Shackleton, the legendary explorer.

Ballitore G4 is a charming village which was founded by Quakers in 1685. Visit the 18th century home of writer Mary Leadbeater which now houses a library and a museum of Quaker artefacts and writings.

Ballymore Eustace F3 is an attractive town. In the churchyard of St. John's church are two interesting monolithic granite crosses.

Castledermot G4 is a testament to the artistic work of Irish monks over 1,000 years ago; the old churchyard contains a pair of exceptionally beautiful Celtic crosses and a round tower. Close by is the ancient castle of Kilkea.

The Curragh F4 is a vast plain that has been a horse-racing venue from the earliest times. It is the headquarters of Irish racing today, and here the Irish Derby and other classic races are decided. For nearly a century the Curragh Camp has been an important military station and training centre and this is reflected in the military museum at the barracks.

Kilcock E4 is a picturesque town situated on the banks of the Royal Canal. It is home to the Larchill Arcadian Gardens. The old bog road which is 4.5km west from Kilcock on the main N4 was the subject of poet Teresa Braydon's song "the old bog road".

Kildare F3 is an ancient cathedral town, located beside the Curragh plain & race course. A place of importance & interest is the cathedral & round tower. St. Brigid, in the 5th century, established it as a monastery. It was remarkable in having both nuns and monks. The round tower that stands beside the cathedral was built more than a thousand years ago and is one of the few that can still be climbed. On the outskirts of town is the National Stud & St. Fiachra's Gardens & Kildare Village Outlet.

Kill F4 is a pretty village which has won numerous awards in the prestigious Tidy Towns Competition. Behind the main street is a large earthen enclosure on Kill Hill and a mote, which offers the visitor an impression of the town's ancient past. Kill has been identified as the burial place of the Kings of Leinster. The famous Goff's Bloodstock sales ring, where over half of all Irish bred horses are sold, is located nearby.

Leixlip E5 is located on the banks of the River Liffey. Points of interest are Leixlip Castle, St. Mary's Church (12th century) and an unusual "barn", a five storey circular building with a winding stone stairway around it; it was built in 1743 to provide work for the poor.



Maynooth E4 boasts a university and a 13th century castle. This castle has an exhibition during summer months in the keep of the castle. The 19th century university building has a bell tower, a spire, and the chapel is particularly interesting. There is a national science museum there which has two specialities: religion and physics, it opens during summer months. Just outside Maynooth is Carton House, built by the Dukes of Leinster, it is now a hotel & golf club.

Moone G4 is a small village famous for its granite High Cross which is one of the finest examples in Ireland. This area was inhabited 6,000 years ago, which makes it one of the oldest inhabited areas in the country.

Naas F4 is at the centre of the sport of Kings – horse racing! The Irish for Naas is Nás na Riogh the Assembly Place of the Kings. Its English form 'Naas' is pronounced so that it rhymes with race, and that is most appropriate because one of Ireland's busiest and best-loved race courses is on the very edge of the town.

The Kings in the name were the kings of Leinster and an earthen mound in the town is the site of the ancient royal palace.

Newbridge F4 famous for "Newbridge Silverware" has a visitor centre and museum of style icons, which has exhibited items belonging to the Beatles, Marilyn Monroe. Audrey Hebburn and Michael Jackson to mention a few!

Robertstown F4 is a lovely canal-side village. Robertstown is a great centre for exploring the Grand Canal and its neighbouring Bog of Allen. Close by is Pollardstown Fen. which is an important nature reserve.

Straffan E4 is a small village which can boast the K Club which hosted the Ryder Cup in 2006, a Steam Museum and Straffan Butterfly Farm.

Established in 1946, the Irish National Stud is the only stud farm in Ireland open to the public and is a must see for any visitor to the area. The state of the art horse museum tells the story of Ireland's long love affair with horse racing, and horse racing's love affair with Ireland. Experience St. Fiachra's gardens, inspired by the monastic movement in Ireland during the 6th and 7th centuries. Visit the internationally renowned and acclaimed Japanese gardens created to symbolise the 'Life of Man'. With so much to see and do, a trip to the National Stud is an unforgettable experience.

Castletown is the largest and most significant Palladian style country house in Ireland. The house is set amongst beautiful 18th century parklands of Celbridge, Co.Kildare. The house was built c.1722 for the speaker of the Irish House of Commons, William Conolly (1622- 1729). The designs of a number of important architects were used, Alessandro Gailiei, Sir Edward Lovett Pearce and Sir William Chambers. The estate was sold in 1965 and in 1967 the house and some parkland were purchased by the Hon. Desmond Guinness. It was transferred to State Care in 1994.

Open:1st April – 30th October 10.00 – 18.00. Closed on Mondays except on Bank Holidays. Last admission for tours of the house is 16.45.

Tours: Tuesday to Sunday. Parklands - open daily, 8.00 - 20.00.

Castletown can close at very short notice for Government business. Tours may have limited access if there is an event or private function running in the house.

Admission: Adult: €4.50, Senior/Student/Child of 5 & over: €3.50

Family: €12.50, Group: 20 adults €3.50 each.

Wheelchair access is restricted to the basement and ground floor Museum rooms.

Kildare Town Heritage Centre is an exciting visitor attraction situated in

the picturesque medieval town of Kildare. Located in the restored 18th century Market House opposite St Brigid's Cathedral, the Heritage Centre hosts a multi-media exhibition telling the story of Kildare. An audio visual presentation lets Cogitosus, a 7th century monk take you on a fascinating journey through time from when St Brigid established her church in 480AD, to later centuries when Kildare was raided by Vikings and later ruled by the Normans. Kildare Town Heritage Centre is the ideal starting point for a tour of the county.

Open: Monday – Saturday: 9.30 – 13.00 and 14.00 – 17.00. **Admission:** Free of charge. **Wheelchair accessible:** Tourist Office is wheelchair accessible; the Heritage Centre is not accessible.

St Brigid's Cathedral is a beautifully restored Norman Cathedral that occupies

the site of the original pagan shrine to the goddess Brigid, the early Christian foundation and church of St. Brigid. Designed in an early gothic style with a square central tower, the Cathedral was built in troubled times for defence as well as for a place to worship. The grounds of the Cathedral contain a number of fascinating links to the early history of the site including a round tower, Celtic cross and St. Brigid's firehouse.

Open: May – September, Monday – Saturday from 10.00 – 13.00 and 14.00 – 17.00. Sunday from 14.00 – 17.00. Group visits are possible outside these months by prior arrangement. **Admission:** Suggested donation to enter the Cathedral. Climb the round tower: €4.

Wheelchair accessible: No wheelchair access to Round Tower.

The Bog of Allen Nature Centre is run

by the Irish Peatland Conservation Council. On visiting you will explore Ireland's peatland heritage from the uses of peat, peatland formation, flora and fuana of peatlands, traditional methods of hand cutting turf, archaeology of peatlands and the their industrial development. The centre also offers wildlife gardens that you can walk through at your leisure where you can visit Ireland and the U.K's largest public display of insect eating plants. Before you leave why not visit an example of an intact raised bog.

House Athy Heritage Centre-Museum brings the history of Athy to life from its Anglo Norman settlement to the Quakers, Great Famine, Grand Canal, 1903 Gordon Bennett Motor Race, Athy men in WW1 and more. Home of the only permanent exhibition in the world to Kildare born Polar explorer Ernest Shackleton, which includes 15 foot model of the ship Endurance. Also hosts an annual Ernest Shackleton International Autumn School-October bank holiday weekend. Audio quides-30 seated audio visual room brings the whole experience to life.

It was rebuilt after a fire in the 1890s by James Franklin Fuller. The La Touche family lived in the house until 1920.

Leixlip Castle E5 Leixlip. Tel: 01 6244430. Leixlip village was established by the Vikings. Adam de Hereford, a follower of Strongbow, built the castle. Features of the castle include, the front hall, which boasts a 17th century Brussels tapestry depicting Theodosius offering the head of Pompey to Caesar. Open: Contact directly for opening hours. NATIONAL MONUMENT

Donadea Forest Park E4 The park covers 243ha of mixed woodland. There are many historical features including the remains of the castle, walled gardens, church, tower, ice house, boat house and lime tree avenue. There is also a 2.3ha lake with ducks and other birds, and a wonderful display of water-lilies in the summer. Open: Winter; 8.00 - 19.00, Summer, 8.00 - 21.00. Charge for Car Park: ≤ 4 .

EMO COURT, CO. LAOIS

Laois

Laois is a fascinating county with much to attract the visitor. Tranquility is easily found along the banks of the Grand Canal at Vicarstown, or on the walking routes in the Slieve Bloom Mountains.

Visit the Round Tower at Timahoe or the Romanesque door at Killeshin old church. Enjoy the gardens surrounding the splendid Gandon House at Emo and the Lutyens gardens at Heywood. Portlaoise, the county town is rich in retail therapy and nightlife and is a key gateway to the Slieve Bloom Mountains.

There are reminders in Portarlington of its Huguenot past, Mountmellick is famous for its lace, while the estate towns of Durrow and Abbeyleix, the latter a designated heritage town with an award winning library, have their own unique character.

Castletown is a pleasant village to visit, set on the banks of the river Nore and built around a triangular green, fragments of a castle dating back to 1182 remain. The village performs well in the annual tidy towns competition and has won a gold medal in this category.

Stradbally is famous for its steam festival and museum. Why not visit the Donaghmore famine museum and the fly fishing museum in Attanagh. The county has fine uncrowded golf courses, good fishing and excellent equestrian facilities.



Laois towns and villages

Whether your passion is heritage, the great outdoors, or buzzing nightlife, Laois has something for everyone. Here are some towns and villages that are waiting to be explored:

Abbeyleix village G2 of gracious town houses was planned & created in the 18th century by the landlord Viscount de Vesci. The 19th century school house at the north end of the village stands in a pleasant garden and is now Abbeyleix Heritage House. It's exhibits tell the history of County Laois. The smaller Sexton's House has been preserved and used to exhibit a wonderful collection of 19th century furniture and domestic equipment. The Abbey Sense Garden (sensory garden) occupies the old walled garden of the Brigidine Convent, founded in 1842. It aims to capture all five senses. A bowls court has been set out in the gardens, one of very few places in Ireland where this French game can be enjoyed.

Ballinakill G2 is an example of a 17th century market town that can boast an outdoor swimming pool for summer use! The town's entrance from Abbeyleix is marked by two trees known as toll trees where a toll was paid by visitors to the town. Close by are the impressive Heywood gardens.

Cullahill H2 has an impressive early fifteenth-century tower house, the principal stronghold of MacGillapatricks of Upper Ossory. The 'castle' has an interesting Sheela-na-Gig, and a medieval church.

Donaghmore G2 has attractive buildings and overlooks a river and old bridge. A former famine workhouse is open to the public all year. During the Great Famine, some 10 per cent of the local population sought refuge here. Now restored, visitors can see the original dormitories, kitchen and waiting hall, plus the agricultural museum.

Durrow G2 is a charming village; the name comes from the Irish "doire", meaning an oak wood, and is a reminder of the great oak forests that covered much of Ireland in the past. Early in the 18th century, Colonel William Flower acquired the estate and built Castle Durrow, a magnificent classical mansion that is now a country club hotel.

Emo F3 boasts the impressive Emo Court which was designed in 1790 by architect James Gandon. The house is surrounded by beautiful gardens and parkland that date from the 18th century and contain formal lawns. a lake and forest walks.

Kelleshin G3 is an important monastic centre whose name may derive from Gleann Uissean, the valley in which it was established or from Kill Uisin, the church of Oisin.

Mountmellick F2 is a bustling colourful town originally enterprised by the Quaker community. An old grain mill has been renovated and houses a Quaker museum. The main focus is to conserve and display original pieces of Mountmellick embroidery of which the town is renowned and to protect the memory of



Mountmellick's rich Quaker industrial past. It is an attractive town with a fine square, architecturally impressive houses, shops and ecclesiastical buildings.

Portarlington F3 was developed from a 17th century Huguenot colony; it is a charming riverside town with an interesting assortment of architecture. One of its most treasured possessions is the Church register with entries from 1694 to 1816. The park is presided over by the colossal granite sculpture of a 'reclining bather by Dick Joynt which celebrates 'the universality of women and the triumph of the human spirit'.

Portlaoise G2 the capital of Laois, is a vibrant town with interesting shops & good restaurants & nightlife, there is easy access to a wide range of places to visit & things to do. It is a vibrant place with many festivals throughout the year to keep visitors entertained.

Rosenallis F2 is a village situated on the northeast end of Capard Ridge in the Slieve Bloom Mountains. Several viewing points in the vicinity provide a wonderful vista of the lush green central plain of Ireland. It is said that you can see six counties from the "Stoney Man" on the ridge of Capard.

Stradbally's G3 name translates as 'the village on the street' – which describes it very well. Stradbally Hall, the Cosbys' stately home, was begun in 1772 and greatly enlarged and embellished in the 1860s in its present Italianate style. The Irish Steam Preservation Society holds its steam rally here during the August bank holiday. Also in the grounds is the Stradbally hall narrow gauge railway. It runs on bank holidays, and on request, except in winter. The popular "Electric Picnic" music event is held in Stradbally annually.

Vicarstown F3 is an attractive village on the Grand Canal. Buildings of interest include the 1860's Grattan School and Grattan Lodge (built in 1882 by Henry Grattan's grand-daughter Lady Pauline Grattan Bellew). Vicarstown is a good base to visit Fisherstown where one of the oldest pubs in Ireland is located.

Emo Court was designed by the architect James Gandon in 1790 for the Earls of Portarlington and is a magnificent example of this neo-classical style. During the middle of this century it was owned by the Jesuits, it was then acquired and extensively restored by Mr. Cholmeley-Harrison in the 1960s. The house is surrounded by beautiful gardens and parkland which were first laid out in the 18th century and contain formal lawns, a lake and woodland walks. The house and gardens were taken into State ownership in 1994.

Open: House: Easter (21st April) to 28th Sept, Daily 10.00 – 18.00. **Admission:** Adult: €3, Senior/Group: €2, Child/Student: €1, Family: €8.

Donaghmore Famine Workhouse Museum is a unique attraction and aims to tell the story of the families who lived and died within the famine workhouse walls before, during and after the great famine. The museum uses guided and self-guided tours combined with various exhibits to explain the socio-economic conditions which led to the establishment of this and other workhouses. The Rock of Dunamaise is an imposing and magnificent example of the remains of a Celtic fortification overlooking the valley

of the O'Moores. It has a colourful history boasting ownership by Strongbow in 1170 and becoming the Norman's most important fortification. In the fourteenth century it was burned at least twice by the Irish and later ownership went to the Earl of Thomand. It eventually fell into decay in 1795 leaving spectacular remains. Standing at over 45 meters in height, the ruin dominates the landscape.

ABBEYS & CHURCHES

Aghaboe Abbey G2 Ballacolla. The abbey was founded by St. Canice in 576. About two hundred years later it was plundered by Norsemen and a further church was built. Over the centuries many attacks and fires resulted in the Abbey having to be rebuilt.

Timogue Church G3 is a wonderful and rare church dating from about 1736. There is an impressive early monument to a Fitzgerald of Morette, and the aisle is flagged with memorials also to members of the Fitzgerald family. Nearby are two ring-forts, a ruined mill and the site of a tower house.

Timahoe Round Tower G3 An extraordinary carved doorway makes this the most elegant round tower in Ireland. Carvings of human heads, with flowing beards and moustaches, decorate the main entrance, about five meters from the ground. Smaller carvings decorate a second storey window. The round tower was built some time in the 1100s, the tower rises almost 30 meters high and is more than 17 meters wide at its base. Its walls are nearly 2 meters thick. Inside there are five different floors, which were reached by ladders.

A Sheela-na-Gig carved in stone is on the front facing wall, a pagan fertility symbol to ward off evil. Open to the public by appointment.


What ever you are looking for in a holiday, be it a guiet break or an action packed getaway, Louth with its rich medieval past abounds with interesting places to see and a host of different things to do.

Louth offers plenty of fun-filled days for families on holiday, whether it is visiting the monastic sites of Mellifont and Monasterboice or the many fascinating buildings including St. Laurence's Gate, Millmount Motte and Martello Tower. Spending a day at one of the several seaside resorts, summer camps, participating in a range of activities, or just stocking up on the local delicacies at fantastic farmers' markets, families will enjoy the Louth experience.

Louth also offers a wide range of shops, if you are looking for anything from traditional gifts to designer labels you will be sure to find it in one of the shopping centres, craft centres, or chic boutiques which makes for an extremely pleasurable shopping experience.

Louth is walker's paradise, with the legendary Cooleys providing the scenic backdrop as well as the perfect terrain for a walking holiday. Follow the path of Queen Meave on the **Táin Trail** or walk the 40km Táin Way which encircles the Cooley Peninsula in the north-east of the county.







Louth towns and villages

Louth is a captivating area of mountains and valleys.

Annagassan C5 is a coastal village with a surprisingly eventful past. Originally a small port with a busy harbour pier; the Norsemen captured the settlement in 831. It wasn't until 928 that the Vikings were eventually defeated by the native Irish and driven from the locality.

Ardee C4 derives its name from the folklore tradition of a duel between the legendary Irish heroes, Ferdia and Cuchulainn near the river Dee. There are a number of places of interest in both the town and the hinterland of historic and recreational interest, including a 14th century Norman Castle and the strange tale of the "jumping church" in Kildemock. Ardee is an ideal base from which to explore the mysteries of the Boyne Valley and Cooley Peninsula.

Ballymascanion B5 is a small parish situated 4km north-east of Dundalk on the road to Carlingford. This parish derives its name from the sept of the Scanlon's, its ancient proprietors. Visitors can visit Proleek Dolmen and a wedge tomb close by.

Baltray C5 is an idyllic village on the shore of the Boyne estuary. The area is of considerable importance for its wildlife preservation, which includes frequent feathered visitors such as ducks, brent geese, waders and ringed plovers.

Blackrock B5 is perched on the very edge of the sea, with a promenade and wonderful views over Dundalk Bay to the mountains. When the tide goes out it reveals an immense area of sand flats, seeming to stretch all the way to the Cooley mountains, although interrupted by the narrow channel that leads to Dundalk port.

Carlingford B5 is an area of outstanding natural beauty surrounded by the Cooley and Mourne mountains, Carlingford lough & King John's castle. The medieval village of Carlingford is a delight to stroll around with its shops, restaurants, coffee shops, traditional pubs and crafts. Visitors can participate in a host of water & land based activities in Carlingford.

Dromiskin Village C5 was an important ecclesiastical centre from the 5th century. A round tower from the early monastery still stands in the churchyard of the Church

of Ireland parish church. There are also the remains of a ringed cross in the Celtic style and a carved spiral pillar from the 9th - 10th century close by.

Collon C4 is a manorial hamlet which has medieval origins. The original settlement on the site was granted a Tuesday market by Henry III in 1229. The village is most famous for being the base of the Cistercian Abbey of new Mellifont.

Drogheda D5 is a medieval town with a wealth of historical interest. The most venerated possession is preserved in St. Peter's Church, the head of St. Oliver Plunkett, Archbishop of Armagh, who was executed in London in 1681. The town contained monasteries of a number of religious orders and their ruins stand in various parts of the town, together with the barbican tower of the ancient walls. Close to it are some of the fine town houses built in the 18th century. The former St. Mary's Church has been beautifully restored to recreate the fascinating world of ancient Drogheda. High above the town is Millmount, where the 19th century garrison barracks and Martello Tower have been transformed to a visitor centre.

Dundalk B5 is a thoroughly modern town in the midst of a land of ancient legend; Dundalk offers all the perks of city life, combined with easy access to the countryside, steeped in history and tradition. St. Nicholas's Church was built on foundations from the 13th century and rebuilt more than once. It contains some Dutch stained glass from the 16th century, a number of interesting medieval tombs and a memorial to Robert Burns, whose sister lived nearby. The modern Church of the Holy Redeemer has sculptures by some of the best contemporary artists. The prize-winning County Museum, in a beautifully restored late 18th century warehouse, offers an extensive programme of permanent exhibitions, temporary displays & performances

Termonfeckin C5 village is situated on the eastern shore of the county and has an extensive stretch of golden beach, only a stroll from its centre. The origin of its name dates to the 7th century when a monastery was founded here by St. Fechin.

Tullyallen C5 is perched high above the Boyne. Human activity on the hill is shown to date back 6,000 years. A battle for control of the English Crown took place in the area in the 17th century - The Battle of the Boyne (1690). From the village, both the river and battle site are reached via the famous King William's Glen. Nearby Townley Hall Forest Park provides the opportunity for an invigorating hike.

Monasterboice is the remains of the monastic settlement founded by Saint Buite who died in 521. The remains consist of an old graveyard, two churches, three sculptured crosses, two early grave slabs and a sundial.

The South church is the older of the two and still has the remains of the chancel arch. The smaller church is situated beside the round tower. The round tower is about 30 metres high. It is now missing its upper part and conical cap. The door is 2 metres above ground level and is approached by modern steps. The cross nearest the graveyard entrance is Muirdeach's Cross, an outstanding example of high crosses of the Early Christian period in Ireland. It is a monolith, 5 metres high. Monasterboice is definitely worth a visit and is a fine example of early Christian Ireland.

CASTLES & MONUMENTS

Castle Roche Ruins B5 Dungooley Rd, Dundalk. Castle Roche is one of the most striking Anglo-Norman castles in Ireland and can be viewed for miles around. Located on a rocky hilltop, it commands wonderful views of the surrounding countryside. Lady Rohesia de Verdun had the castle built in 1236 AD. Legend has it that Lady Rohesia promised her hand in marriage to the architect if he completed the castle to her satisfaction. When he went to claim her hand, she had him thrown from one of the windows, which to this day is known as the 'murder window'.

Castletown Motte B5 Mount Ave, Dundalk. The De Verdon's built Castletown Motte and Bailey in the late 12th century. The motte comprises a large circular mound which rises to some 20m and is enclosed by a ditch with an external bank.

Cúchulainn's Stone B4 Rathiddy, Knockbridge. Clochafarmore standing stone is an impressive monument standing at over 3 meters high and 1.3m wide. It is believed that standing stones may mark locations where great events took place and this stone is traditionally associated with the greatest hero of Irish folklore - Cúchulainn.

King John's Castle Ruins B5 Carlingford. The castle is located on the southern shores of Carlingford Lough. The Lough was named by the Vikings and means 'bay of the hag'. Built by Hugh de Lacy, this dramatic fortress offers stunning views across the Lough towards the Mourne Mountains.

Proleek Dolmen B5 Ballymascanlon. The Proleek Portal Tomb is about 3 meters high and has a huge capstone weighing approximately 35 tons. Legend says that a wish will be granted to anyone who can throw a pebble on its capstone (that stays there).

CHURCHES & SETTLEMENTS

Kildemock Jumping Church C4 Ardee. This remarkable church ruin is in the town land of Millockstown, 4km south of Ardee. The gable wall is standing upright, two feet inside its original foundations.

Saint Brigid's Shrine & Well B5 Faughart. Situated 5km from Dundalk, the hill of Faughart is one of the great historical sites of North Louth, scene of several incidents in the Tain Bo Cuailgne, the archaeology of which indicated remnants of an Iron Age hill fort, an early Christian ecclesiastical foundation associated with Saint Brigid, a Norman motte-castle and a medieval church ruin.


St. Laurence's Gate D5 Drogheda. St. Laurence's Gate, which led to the Friary of St Laurence, is widely regarded as one of the finest of its kind in Europe. It consists of two lofty circular towers, connected together by a wall, in which there is an archway. Visitors can appreciate the spectacular dimensions of the medieval walls south of the gate at Featherbed Lane.

St. Peter's Church D5 Drogheda. St. Peter's Church is among the finest Gothic revival churches in Ireland and is famous for housing the shrine of St. Oliver Plunkett.

Magdalene Tower D5 Magdalene St, Drogheda. The Magdalene Tower is all that now remains of the once important Dominican Friary. It is the belfry tower of the friary which Lucas de Netterville, then Archbishop of Armagh, founded early in about 1224.

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

The rich heritage of County Meath ensures that every visit is memorable. Don't miss the chance to visit the world renowned prehistoric tombs at Brú na Bóinne (Newgrange), and the site of the Battle of the Boyne, located near Oldbridge.


Kells with its High Cross and Round Tower, the splendid Norman Castle at Trim, the fabled Hill of Tara near Navan and the holy Hill of Slane are just some of the sites to be explored.

There is horse racing at Fairyhouse, the home of the Irish Grand National, Bellewstown and Navan. There are special gardens to visit at Loughcrew, Dunboyne and Kells, and good fishing to be found in the River Boyne, the Royal Canal, Lough Sheelin and Drumconrath Lakes.

The wide range of equestrian centres and golf courses throughout the county, including the links at Bettystown/Laytown make Meath a destination worth discovering.

County Meath is delighted to be the Host County to the 2011 Solheim Cup, with Killeen Castle as the perfect location, when the famed event comes to Ireland between 23rd and 25th of September.





Meath towns and villages

Meath is a county, rich in heritage and culture.

Athboy D3 village is the medieval creation of the Plunkett family. Overlooking the town of Athboy is the Hill of Tlachtga or "Hill of Ward", an Iron Age ring fort, where the great Celtic feast of Samhain (Halloween) is said to have originated.

Bettystown D5 is a thriving village with a fine sandy beach. The world famous "Tara Brooch" was discovered on this beach! Close by the Laytown beach boasts horse racing on the beach! The only strand races held in Europe.

Kells C3 is a delightful town. The most celebrated part of Kells is preserved in Trinity College, Dublin. The Book of Kells is one of the most beautiful books in the world, an 8th century manuscript of the Four Gospels painted by the monks of the monastery founded in Kells for the followers of the great St. Colmcille. The curving road around the church on the hill follows the outline of the ancient monastery. The highlights of ancient Kells are clustered around the protestant church, with its medieval tower and graceful 18th century steeple. There are three Celtic crosses in the churchyard and a round tower. Across the road is a small, stone-roofed church, one of the oldest monastic buildings in Ireland. The Hill of Lloyd tower nearby resembles a lighthouse! and has a park and wonderful views.

Navan D4 is a busy centre set on high ground where the River Boyne is joined by its tributary the Blackwater, close by are the ruins of Athlumney castle. Navan's churches, shops and handsome town houses are mostly 19th century work. In the middle of some of the richest pasture in Ireland, it was an important market town. In the 1960's Navan became a mining town, with the development of Tara Mines, Europe's greatest source of lead and zinc.

Nobber C4 was the birthplace of Turlough O'Carolan, composer, poet and the most famous of all Irish harpists.

Oldcastle C3 is an idyllic village, five thousand years ago the affluent stone-age community, who lived where Oldcastle now stands, decided to commemorate their dead on the nearby hilltops. Their legacy lives on with Loughcrew Cairns. Most of

them are 'passage graves' built to the same design as the world-famous examples at Newgrange. Oldcastle's is also home to Loughcrew Gardens. The demesne was once the property of the Plunkett family and the childhood home of its most distinguished member, the 17th century Oliver Plunkett, archbishop, martyr and saint. There can be no doubt that he worshipped in the old church that still stands in the gardens.

Rathcairn D3 is a Gaeltacht area in Meath, where the Irish language is spoken and the traditional way of life is embraced through music & dance.

Slane D4 is a beautiful manorial village built around a crossroads; the central focus of the village are the four fine Georgian Houses facing each other. The Conynghams, successors of the great Norman Lords of Slane, planned Slane. It was here, from the top of the hill overlooking the village, that St. Patrick lit the paschal flame on Easter eve (in the second half of the fifth century), a symbol of the light of Christianity, which was about to sweep away the old pagan order. A short distance from the village on the Navan road is Slane Castle, an imposing castellated mansion with towers and embattled parapets, built on a beautiful site overlooking the river valley. Built by the Conyngham family, it is the home of Lord Henry, Earl of Mountcharles, and has become famous as a concert venue; the surrounding grounds boasting a natural amphitheatre of immense size.

Trim D4 with its magnificent castle by the River Boyne is one of the most spectacular medieval towns in Ireland. At The Ford of the Elder Tree — as its name in Irish translates - St. Patrick established a monastery and left it in the care of his nephew St. Loman. Great monasteries came to be built in the area and the towers and walls of some of them still stand, adding to the beauties of Trim's skyline. But the most important event took place in 1172 when Hugh de Lacy began the building of the castle. Declared a dangerous building in 1403, it has remained standing for seven hundred years and now, made safe and accessible, it welcomes visitors. The last sounds of battle were heard in 1994 when the castle took its place in the film Braveheart.

The Battle of the Boyne between King William III and his father-in-law, King James II, was fought on 1 July 1690 (11 July according to our modern calendar). Both kings commanded their armies in person, 36,000 on the Williamite side and 25,000 on the Jacobite side - the largest number of troops ever deployed on an Irish battlefield. At stake were the British throne, French dominance in Europe and Religious power in Ireland. The Battle of the Boyne Visitor Centre is located in the recently restored 18th century Oldbridge House, which is on the battlesite.

Trim Castle, the largest Anglo-Norman castle in Ireland, was constructed over

a thirty-year period by Hugh de Lacy and his son Walter. Hugh de Lacy was granted the Liberty of Meath by King Henry II in 1172 in an attempt to curb the expansionist policies of Richard de Clare, (Strongbow). Construction of the massive three storied Keep, the central stronghold of the castle, was begun c. 1176 on the site of an earlier wooden fortress.

During the Vernal and Autumn Equinox people gather at dawn in Cairn T to watch sunlight enter the chamber and illuminate the inside of the tomb.

CHURCHES. ABBEYS & TOWERS

St. Columba's Church C3 Kells. The grounds mark the original site of the Monastery of Kells. According to the 'Book of Lismore', King Diarmait or Dermot, High King of Ireland granted to Columba the Dun or Fort of Kells to establish a religious community.

St. Patrick's Cathedral D4 Trim is in a historic setting on an ancient site with a 15th century tower. It is reputed to be older than Armagh or Canterbury. The fine stone tower is a remnant of the medieval parish church of Trim.

Bective Abbey D4 near Navan boasts views overlooking the Boyne and is the second Cistercian Abbey to be established in Ireland. Although most of the present impressive ruins date to the 15th century, the abbey was originally founded in 1147. The abbey was one of the most important monastic sites in the country, as the Abbot of Bective sat in the Parliament of the Pale. Hugh De Lacy, was buried there in 1195, but was eventually reinterred in Dublin. Bective Abbey was used in the filming of the movie Braveheart, chosen because of it's castle like qualities. The ruins are readily accessible to the public.

Donaghmore Round Tower D4 is located close to Navan. The settlement includes the church and a fine round tower which was built sometime in the 10th century and is still in good condition.

Lloyd Tower C3 The Hill of Lloyd is 3km North West of Kells. Its most striking feature is an 18th century folly in the form of a lighthouse, erected by the son of the Earl of Bective in his father's memory.


Fourknocks D5 at Ardcath are passage graves decorated with abstract art and bear the first depiction of a human face found in prehistoric art in Ireland. Three earthen mounds were excavated by the National Museum in 1950-1952. One covered a passage grave to crucification plan, with decoted uprights and lintels resembling the Newgrange designs. The contents of this tomb were intact and so the results were of immense importance and value to students of the megalithic period in Ireland and the world. Monaghan The visitor to County Monaghan will find an interesting landscape, a friendly atmosphere and activities to suit most interests. Good fishing for the angler, beautiful countryside for horse-riding, walking and cycling, glorious greens for golfing and pitch and putt, entertainment to suit every taste and tempo, plenty of resources for the amateur genealogist tracing their roots, a host of water sports and outdoor pursuits and many fabulous forest parks.

The virtues of being off the beaten tourist track mean that visitors can enjoy their stay in Monaghan being looked after by and in the company of Monaghan people. Pursuing their interests in the company of the locals enable tourists to get a true flavour of the county. The accommodation available leaves nothing to be desired and there are cafés and restaurants to suit every palate and pocket.

The good humour, wit and inquisitive friendliness of Monaghan people makes visitors to the county feel wanted and welcome, while the natural beauty of the area makes them want to linger for longer. Many tourists are inclined to extend their stay and most return year after year to enjoy the magic of Monaghan.







Monaghan towns and villages

Monaghan is a must for a number of reasons, including its unique attractions, activities, vibrant festivals and great food.

Ballybay B3 is situated to the south of the county; it is the smallest of the principal towns with a population of 1,052. The town which is located beside Lough Major was founded on the linen industry but is now a prominent angling centre with several excellent waters.

Carrickmacross B4 is a pretty market town which developed around a Castle built by the Earl of Essex in 1630. The Convent of the St. Louis Nuns now stands on the original castle site. The Nuns were largely responsible for the revival of lace-making skills in the region and the Carrickmacross Lace Co-operative has been instrumental in keeping the tradition alive today. This lace may be purchased at The Lace Gallery, Market Square where demonstrations of this skill can be given by prior request. One of the most imposing buildings in the town is the Roman Catholic Church. Of particular significance in the church are the ten beautiful stained-glass windows which were designed by the renowned artist Harry Clarke in 1925. Other buildings of note include the 18thc St Finbar's Protestant Church with its magnificent steeple, the Courthouse and the historic Magheross Church.

Castleblayney B4 is situated to the east of the county close to the Armagh border. It has a population of 3,000 and is home to Country and Western Music in the County. The town is well known for its musical links with Big Tom and Paddy Cole. Music nights are held in its many fine pubs. The town was founded on the site of an early Christian Church. Hope Castle was named after Henry Hope, owner of one of the largest uncut diamonds in the world.

Clones A3 has many buildings and sites of historical interest. The Diamond is dominated by the Church of Ireland and an early 9/10th century High Cross. Other buildings of note in and around the town include the Presbyterian Church, and the ruins of John Wesley's Methodist Church.

Monaghan Town A3 The capital of the county is Monaghan Town situated to the North of the county. The town is the focal point of the county's furniture industry,

poultry, and mushroom production. It is a lively town with some wonderful architecture that can best be appreciated on foot.

The County Museum is well worth a visit. St. Macartan's Cathedral was built in 1892 and contains interesting Stations of the Cross and tapestries. Other buildings of particular note around the town include the original 17thc, Market House, the Courthouse, St Patrick's Church of Ireland, and the First Monaghan Presbyterian Church.

Rockcorry B3 developed as a result of the linen industry which was founded by the Corr family. An obelisk-style monument, situated between Cootehill and Rockcorry, was erected by local electors in honour of the 18th c. MP Richard Dawson.

Inniskeen B4 was the birthplace in 1904 of the poet and novelist, Patrick Kavanagh. Places such as 'Shancoduff Farm' or 'My Black Shanco' and 'Kednaminsha School', which are associated with the poet's work, are all clearly signposted.

Glaslough Village A3 originated from the presence of Castle Leslie. The castle is now an up market hotel but visitors can walk around the grounds, exploring the splendid gardens of this 405ha estate. Donagh Graveyard contains the ruins of an early Christian Church and High Cross. Donagh's original 12th C. Bronze crucifix is currently used in processions at Monaghan Cathedral.

Donaghmoyne B4 sign-posted off the Carrickmacross to Castleblaney road, is the location of the Mannan Castle 18-hole Parkland Golf Course. The ruins of Mannan Castle, with its motte and bailey, are still clearly visible.

Newbliss B3 the home of the Tyrone Guthrie Centre at Annaghmakerrig, is situated close to Clones. The Tyrone Guthrie Centre is a residential arts centre dedicated to the great theatre director Sir Tyrone Guthrie. It is surrounded by 450 acres of forest and lake which give it a seclusion and tranquillity idyllically suited to its new role as a workplace for artists.

Scotshouse B2 located just outside Clones is a village with an historic past. Remnants of an ancient border - the Black Pigs Dyke run through here and it is the birthplace of Arthur Griffiths. There are two historic graveyards in the village - Drum Swords and Magheratemple.





Wicklow's picturesque towns and villages have attracted many film makers for years producing such films as "Excalibur", "Michael Collins" and "Braveheart". Popular TV series such as "Ballykissangel" and "Glenroe" were filmed in the attractive villages of Avoca and Kilcoole.

The coastal towns of Greystones and Bray offer good pubs, cafes, restaurants and shopping, combined with stunning sea views along the promenade. Or why not explore the heritage town of Baltinglass, in the southwest of the county on the banks of the River Slaney.



Wicklow towns and villages

Wicklow, garden of Ireland, renowned for golden sandy beaches and rolling mountains.

Annamoe G5 is small picturesque village in County Wicklow that is well known for its fishery; there is a small stone humpback bridge which is a popular location to view the beautiful scenery.

Arklow H5 town is an excellent base to explore the Vale of Avoca and the Wicklow Mountains. The glorious sandy beaches of Brittas Bay and Clogga are well worth a visit. There are many activities you can participate in when you visit Arklow such as angling, golfing and swimming.

Ashford G6 is a scenic village and home to the famous Mount Usher Gardens, which boast a famous collection of plants gathered from all corners of the world. Devils Glen Woodland and Waterfall is located 4km west of Ashford on the road to Glendalough via Nuns Cross. The waterfall and pool at the head of the glen is called the Devils Punchbowl.

Aughrim G5 is famous for its granite and is often referred to as the granite village due to the large amount of buildings constructed using local granite, Liverpool Cathedral was also built using this stone. In Aughrim there is a commemorative memorial to honour the memory of those involved in the 1798 rebellion.

Avoca G5 "There is not in the wide world a valley so sweet as that vale in whose bosom the bright waters meet". So sang Thomas Moore in 1807. The Vale of Avoca, already popular in his time, took on immortality. The popular series "Ballykissangel" was filmed here.

Baltinglass G4 is a place oozing in heritage. Bronze Age burial chambers (5,000 years old) have been excavated on the Pinnacle, a 383 metre hill. The Abbey, founded by the King of Leinster Dermot McMurrough in 1148, was built for the Cistercian order of monks, however only ruins remain today.

Blessington F4 village is on the edge of the Wicklow Mountains and has the biggest man made lake in Ireland and offers fantastic leisure activities & a beautiful lake drive (35km). Close by is Russborough, one of the most beautiful of all the great 18th century houses of Ireland.

Bray F6 is a quintessential 19th century town with a promenade & an exhilarating cliff walk and the magnificent Bray Head.

Brittas Bay G6 has a 5km stretch of beautiful white sand dunes and clean beaches and has won & maintained the Blue Flag for many years now. It is ideal for bathing, sailing & walking.

Donard G4 is an enchanting village at the northern end of the Glen of Imaal. The Dwyer McAllister Cottage, which is a few kilometres southeast of the town, is worth a visit to anyone interested in Irish history.



Glendalough G5 and its Monastic site has been one of the most sacred Christian places in Ireland for over a thousand years. Today it still retains its haunting beauty with two silent lakes between steep mountains. Ancient monastic ruins & round tower, rare and beautiful oak forest, exciting cliffs for rock-climbers and mining relics provide endless interest.

Kilcoole F6 just south of Greystones was famous for being the film location of TV series 'Glenroe'. Fans of Glenroe can visit Glenroe Pet Farm. The shingle beach in Kilcoole is a paradise for birdwatchers. This nature reserve runs all the way to Wicklow town where it leads to the Broadlough.

Rathdrum G5 town, situated high on the western side of the beautiful Avonmore valley, offers majestic views of the Avonmore River, which flows through the Vale of Clara. The town has been the location of films like "Michael Collins", "A Love Divided" and "Durango". Avondale House and Forest Park is set on 500 acres. It was the birthplace of Charles Stewart Parnell, one of the greatest political leaders of modern Irish history.

Roundwood F5 claims to be the highest village in Ireland, and has a lovely setting on the edge of the Wicklow Mountains.

Shillelagh H4 is a 17th century planned estate village, with attractive terrace stone houses and a handsome courthouse with a clock tower. Tomnafinnoge Oak Forest, standing just off the Tinahely road, is one of the largest standing oak forests in the country. The Irish shillelagh originates from this village.

Wicklow G6 town is built on the side of a great promontory overlooking the sea; Wicklow enjoys one of the most attractive settings of any Irish town. A centre for fishing, sailing and walking, it has easy access to many of the wonders of the surrounding county including Wicklow Gaol, Wicklow Head & the ruins of Black Castle.





You are never too far away from a beach on Dublin's doorstep with spectacular beaches in Louth, Meath & Wicklow waiting to be explored, these include 5 Blue Flag beaches (Year 2010).

The International Blue Flag programme is operated in Ireland by An Taisce with the support of the Department of the Environment Heritage and Local Government and on behalf of the Foundation for Environmental Education. Each location meets a range of environmental and safety criteria which collectively represent a high level of environmental quality.



The **Blue Flag** is an international, voluntary eco-label for beaches and marinas and is awarded to beaches and marinas that meet a specific set of criteria: Environmental information & education, water quality, safety & services and environmental management.

Touring Routes

We have chosen some great driving routes which will introduce you to many of the region's most famous sights and attractions and also to lesser known gems.

Please note that the length and recommended time of drives are approximate, depending on number of sites visited along routes and time spent there. Routes can be travelled in any direction and from any starting point, map illustrations are intended as a guide only, and routes should be used in conjunction with reference to a good road map of Ireland.



TOUR OF COUNTY LAOIS

Route 1: Borris in Ossory » Abbeyleix » Stradbally » Emo » Mountmellick » Portlaoise

Distance: 103km

This tour starts in **Borris in Ossory** which lies beneath the beautiful Slieve Bloom Mountains, take the R435 signposted Rathdowney, you will pass through Ballybrophy and on to Donaghmore, watch out for a brown



sign for Donaghmore Famine Workhouse Museum on the right.

From Donaghmore continue to Rathdowney on the R435 to do some shopping at the Rathdowney Shopping Outlet.

From Rathdowney take the R433 signposted Abbeyleix to Ballacolla. This is a late eighteenth Century, well kept village, which has access to the Slieve Bloom Mountains.

From Ballacolla turn right onto to R434 to travel to Durrow, turn right onto the N80 signposted Cork to enter the village, one of Durrow's finest features is the suite of buildings around the green under the gates and a battlemented wall which in turn

encloses a tastefully designed modern primary school and the important castle (1713 -32), one of the last large pre-Palladian houses to be built in Ireland.

From Durrow, travel back the N80 signposted Dublin, turn right onto an unnamed road signposted Ballinakill. In Ballinakill turn left at sign for Heywood Gardens, which were designed by Sir Edwin Lutyens. Take a left for Timahoe & Heywood Gardens are on the right.

Leaving Heywood Gardens, turn left, then next right onto the R432, travel to the designated heritage town of Abbeyleix, while there visit the award winning library and Abbeyleix Heritage House.

From **Abbeyleix**, follow the brown signposts to Timahoe, on entering the village turn right to see the Round Tower which was built in the mid 12th century and is one of the finest in Ireland.

From Timahoe, continue straight on an unnamed road, follow signs for Stradbally on entering the village turn left to visit the Steam Museum, with some exhibits dating back over 60 years.

From **Stradbally** you can take a detour on the N80 signposted Port Laoise, you will see a brown sign post to the right to visit the Rock of Dunamaise, a magnificent example of the remains of a Celtic fortification. Leaving Dunamaise, head back on the N80 to Stradbally, on entering Stradbally take a left on to the R427 for Vicarstown.

Turn right for Vicarstown Bridge where tranquility is easily found along the banks of the Grand Canal, Turn back on the road that you came & continue straight ahead, follow signs for Emo. Continue on the R422, signposted Mount Mellick. Continue on to **Emo**, where you can visit Emo Court, designed by James Gandon in 1790 for the Earls of Portarlington.

From Emo travel to **Mountmellick** on the R422, where Mountmellick Museum showcases Mountmellick embroidery that was developed in the 1800's. The Museum also tells the story of Mountmellick's rich Quaker and industrial history.

From Mountmellick, take the N80 to **Portlaoise** the capital of county Laois, where our tour ends in this vibrant town where there are interesting shops, great restaurants & a buzzing nightlife.

THE EXCALIBUR DRIVE

Route 2: Roundwood »
Sally Gap » Enniskerry »
Bray » Greystones »
Newtownmountkennedy »
Roundwood

Distance: 67km

This drive is based around the north of County Wicklow and is 66Km round trip. It passes through various towns and villages in



which the film Excalibur was filmed. This drive starts and finishes in the town of **Roundwood**.

THE EXCALIBER DRIVE CONTINUED

Roundwood is reputedly the highest village in Ireland. At 238m above sea level it is surrounded by some of the most spectacular scenery in the country.

From Roundwood follow the drive north past Victoria's Way, a recreation space for adults including several hand carved black granite sculptures from India. The drive veers left onto the **R759** and on your left passes Lough Tay and the dramatic cliffs of Luggala Estate, which is known locally as the Guinness Estate. At the **Sally Gap** crossroads the Excalibur Drive takes a turn right and you follow the military road past the upper and lower Lough Bray towards the Glencree Valley. Along the Military Road several army barracks were established and the Glencree Barracks is one of them, the barracks are now the Glencree Centre for Peace and Reconciliation. Before coming to the Centre the drive takes a **turn right** along the Glencree River and this small winding road takes you through the valley towards Powerscourt Waterfall. The **Powerscourt Waterfall** is the highest in Ireland tumbling from a height of 120 meters, it is open daily to visitors and is a must see.

Head back to the R760, next on the drive is the Powerscourt Estate near the pretty village of **Enniskerry**. Powerscourt Estate is one of the world's greatest gardens. There is also a terrace café that you can sit back and relax in and have a little something while admiring the beautiful gardens around you.

Next the drive takes you from the leafy setting of Enniskerry on the R117, N11 & R761 (follow signposts for Bray) into the seaside resort of **Bray**. Bray is the longest established seaside town in Ireland. There is a long sand and shingle beach to walk on which is fronted by a spacious Esplanade complete with bandstand.

The drive itself heads south into Greystones on the R761 and you pass **Killruddery House** and Gardens, the most extensive surviving French style garden in Ireland, Follow the sign posts for Greystones, a charming seaside town, with its untouched old style seafront of Georgian and Victorian houses. Behind the seafront runs the attractive Main Street with plenty of excellent shops, coffee shops and restaurants. The drive continues south along the coast road R762, R774 & R761 (follow signposts for Kilcoole) into the village of **Kilcoole**, which is famed for its television series 'Glenroe'. Glenroe farm is an open farm and was one of the locations in which the series was filmed.

Next on the Excalibur drive on Kilcoole main Street turn right onto unnamed road where you will pass the world famous Druids Glen Golf Club which has hosted both the Murphy's Irish Open and the Seve Trophy.

The drive continues to the village of **Newtownmountkennedy**, Ireland's longest place name, turn right onto main street R772, turn right onto the R765 (signposted Roundwood) Turn left onto the R764 entering Roundwood where you can round of vour journey with some bar food and atmosphere in one of the cosy pubs in the village.

MONASTERIES OF LONG AGO: WICKLOW & KILDARE

Route 3: Glendalough » Castledermot » Moone » Kildare

Distance: 91km

The Dublin's Doorstep Region has a great range of outstanding monastic sites, this driving tour begins in Glendalough Co. Wicklow & finishes in Kildare town.

Beginning in **Glendalough**, set

in one of the most beautiful valleys in the Wicklow Mountains and not much more than an hour's drive from Dublin, it remains one of the most breathtaking religious sites in Europe and is an extremely popular location for modern pilgrims, picnickers and mountaineers. St. Kevin established a hermitage there in the 6th century and it quickly developed to become a great monastic establishment. Sheltered by dramatic mountains on either side and with two lakes on the floor of the valley, the monastic ruins include a round tower and the remains of more than seven churches, many of them with interesting romanesque sculpture.

From Glendalough take the R756, sign posted Wicklow Gap over the mountains to Hollywood. Leaving Hollywood take the N81 signposted Baltinglass. At Baltinglass, Cistercian monks settled in 1148 and introduced gothic architecture. Overlooking the River Slaney, part of the nave of their church still stands, displaying a fascinating merging of native romanesque and continental gothic styles.

Leaving Baltinglass take the N81 direction Tullow, turn right onto unnamed road, signposted Castledermot. At **Castledermot**, you meet the first of the Celtic crosses. Two of them stand in the churchyard, carved from massive blocks of granite and decorated with relief sculpture of scenes from the Scriptures and marvellous interlacing abstract forms, also in the churchvard; there is a Romanesque Archway and a 20 metre tower.

Leaving Castledermot take the N9 signposted Dublin, turn right at the Brown sign post for Moone. After this right turn on entering **Moone** village, turn left and go through the entrance with two stone pillars, follow the signposts for Moone High Cross which is one of the finest Celtic crosses in the world. Tall and slender, it is covered with delightful stylised people and animals, real and imaginary.

Leaving Moone village turn left onto R415 then immediate right onto the N9 direction Dublin, then turn left onto R415 sigh posted Kildare. Keep following the signs for Kildare and on entering the town head for the centre where you will find a round tower and a cathedral on a hill. They stand on the site of the nunnery founded by the great St. Brigid in the 5th century and still sacred to her memory. The round tower is one of very few provided with stairs and offers a fantastic view. The cathedral dates to the 13th century and is in active use. Nearby are the Curragh race course, the Irish National Stud and its gardens, all well worth a visit. The busy town of Kildare is liberally supplied with shops including the Kildare Outlet Centre, pubs, restaurants and hotels.

This tour begins in **Drogheda**, while there visit Millmount Museum which is the town museum and has won an International Gulbenkian Museum Award.



Beaulieu House, Gardens & Motor

Museum in Beaulieu Demesne was formed in 1169 by the Blessed Oliver branch of the Plunkett family. Take the R166 from Beaulieu towards Termonfeckin after 4kms take a right at Beaulieu Cross and Beaulieu House is about 1km down the road.

Leaving Beaulieu House return to Drogheda and take the R132 north to Monasterboice to visit the remains of the monastic settlement and round tower founded by Saint Buite in the fifth century. The remains consist of an old graveyard, two churches, three sculptured crosses, two early grave slabs and a sundial. The cross nearest the graveyard entrance is Muirdeach's Cross, an outstanding example of high crosses of the Early Christian period in Ireland.

From Monasterboice take the R168 south take the Old Mellifont Rd on your right which lead to the Old Mellifont abbey. Take the Old Mellifont Rd back to the R138. Turn right on the R138 heading south to the M1 junction.

At the M1 junction take the N51 towards **Slane**. Slane Castle located on the N51 Navan Rd. and is set on the grounds of a 1,500 acre estate through which flows the River Boyne, a few kilometres upstream from the site of the Battle of the Boyne. Over the last quarter of a century Slane Castle has become internationally famous for its summer concerts. Further along the N51 is the Francis Ledwidge Museum. The museum is the cottage birthplace of World War I poet, Francis E. Ledwidge.

From Slane take the N51 to Navan and visit the Solstice Arts Centre. It is a symbol of the belief and pride that Co. Meath feels about its cultural and artistic life. From Navan take the N3 to **Kells**, an area steeped in history. It is well worth taking a look at the high cross and the area in which The Book of Kells originated but is now housed in Trinity College Dublin. There is a good selection of coffee shops and restaurants here so it is an ideal spot to stop for a break.

From Kells take the R163 to **Oldcastle** and visit the Loughcrew Cairns, also known as the Hills of the Witch, are a group of Neolithic passage tombs dating to 3000 BC. While there visit Loughcrew House & Gardens, a serene garden of vistas and unexpected features, the mighty ancient yew walk and the martyr St. Oliver Plunkett's family church create a spirit of mystery and dark history.

From Oldcastle take the R154 to **Trim**. In Trim town stands Trim Castle, it is the largest Anglo-Norman castle in Ireland and was constructed over a 30-year period by Hugh de Lacy.

Carry on to Bective Abbey, about 8kms from Trim on the R161. Bective Abbey was founded in 1147 by Murchadh O Melaghin, King of Meath, for the Cistercians, and was dedicated to the Blessed Virgin. From Bective, follow local roads to the Hill of Tara. Though best known as the seat of the High Kings of Ireland, the Hill of Tara has been an important site since the late Stone Age when a passage tomb was constructed there.

From Tara go north towards the N3 and on to Navan and then take the N51 through Slane to Oldbridge. En route follow the signs for Battle of the Boyne Site on your right. The Battle of the Boyne Visitor Centre is located in the recently restored 18th century Oldbridge House, which is on the battle site. Leaving Battle of the Boyne site follow the signs to Brú na Bóinne via Donore Village. Brú na Bóinne Visitor Centre is on the L1601.

Brú na Bóinne Visitor Centre interprets the Neolithic monuments of Newgrange, Knowth and Dowth. The extensive exhibition includes a full-scale replica of the chamber at Newgrange as well as a full model of one of the smaller tombs at Knowth. All admission to Newgrange and Knowth is through the visitor centre, there is no direct access to these monuments.

Please note: intended visitors to the monuments of Newgrange and Knowth are advised to arrive early in the day at the Brú na Bóinne Visitor Centre.







There are two designated **walking hubs** on Dublin's Doorstep, **Tinahely**, Co. Wicklow where you can access the Wicklow Way waymarked trail (and other walks in the area) and the Slieve Bloom Mountains where you can access the Slieve Bloom waymarked trail (and other walks).

Waymarked Ways

These interesting trails can be enjoyed by walkers of all abilities as the walker can choose to complete the whole trail or choose sections of the trails for shorter walks.

- > The Kildare Way (37km) starts in Kildare and ends in Edenderry, Co. Offaly.
- The Barrow Way (114km) starts in Robertstown, Co. Kildare and ends at St. Mullins, Co. Carlow.
- The Slieve Bloom Way (77km) starts and ends in Glenbarrow, Co Laois.
- The Táin Way (40km) starts and ends in Carlingford, Co. Louth.
- The Wicklow Way (132km) starts in Marley Park, Co. Dublin and ends at Clonegal, Co. Carlow.
- > **The Monaghan Way** (64km) starts in Monaghan town and ends in the pretty village of Iniskeen, near the birthplace of poet and novelist Patrick Kavanagh.

It starts in Dundalk and travels through Castlebellingham, Annagassan, Clogherhead, Termonfeckin, Baltry, in to Drogheda. The final stage of the tour is along the mouth of the river Boyne and into the centre of the town.

 Sliabh Beagh is an area of beautiful, unspoiled countryside dotted with many lakes and rivers and is well suited to cycling. The 5 cycle routes on minor country roads, which vary in length from 29 to 60 Kilometers, are suited to those with good levels of fitness.

 The Táin Trail Cycling Route runs for approx. Whatever the season, each garden in Dublin's Doorstep has something to offer. From large, formal gardens which provide hours of enjoyment, to smaller, more intimate gardens that may only be open to visitors for certain periods of the year, there are wonderful places to visit.

The gardens in Meath are relaxing places to wander around, with spectacular vistas and fantastic follies, or explore the gardening heritage of Laois with five gardens open to the public. Experience the peace and tranquility of the gardens in Louth, or visit Hilton Park Gardens in Monaghan, a lakeside park and garden, with parterre and herbaceous borders.

The Japanese Gardens at Tully, in Kildare were created between the years 1906-1910. The Gardens, planned to symbolise the 'Life of Man', are now of international renown and are acclaimed as the finest Japanese Gardens in Europe

Wicklow, known to all as 'The Garden of Ireland' sets a theme which follows throughout the region. You will find an extraordinary variety of scenery, wild and tame, from remote mountains, through wooded valleys down to the sea. 



A valid driving license is required by the visitor from their country of residence. Driving in Ireland is on the left hand side of the road. Safety belts must be worn at all times by front and back seat passengers. Motorcyclists and their passengers must wear safety helmets whilst driving.

BANKS

Banks are generally open from Monday to Friday from 10.00 – 16.00. Each bank has one later opening day per week. Bureau de Change facilities as well as ATM machines are available at most banks. Money transfers can be organised through Western Union Money Transfer.

CLIMATE

Influenced by the Gulf Stream, Ireland has a mild temperature climate with the average summer temperature around 15°C. Areas close to the coast rarely have a large difference between summer and winter conditions, with an average 10°C difference between January and July. Typical winter weather in Ireland is cloudy and raining with the occasional sunny spell. temperatures around January average 5°C. For regional forecasts, please log onto: www.met.ie

CURRENCY

The unit of currency in the Republic of Ireland is the Euro. One euro consists of 100 cents. Notes are €5, €10, €20, €50, €100, €200, €500. Coins are 1c, 2c, 5c, 10c, 20c, 50c, €1 and €2.

ELECTRICITY

The standard voltage in the Republic of Ireland is 220 volts. Plugs are 3-pin flat, therefore adapters are required for 2-pin appliances. En-suite bathroom shaving points normally have 110 and 240 volt outlets.

In Ireland the general Emergency Telephone number is 999 or 112 – no coins required in telephone coin boxes. These numbers will alert the appropriate service – Fire, Gardaí (Police), Lifeboat, Coastal, Mountain and Cave Rescue Services.


